LEGION FAMILY DAY CAN BE A LIFE SAVER

"Family" is a word that we use frequently in The American Legion. As far as this organization is concerned, it's right up there with "veteran."

Nothing can devastate a family like the loss of a veteran. It's yet another reason why The American Legion has made suicide prevention its top priority. The National Executive Committee unanimously passed **Resolution No.7: American Legion Family Day** at its meeting October 12-13, 2022, in Indianapolis. It establishes American Legion Family Day to be observed annually on the last Saturday of April. It encourages posts to open their doors to members of their community for a day and celebrate the accomplishments of Legionnaires, Sons of The American Legion members, and the American Legion Auxiliary. Among the goals is education.

Let visitors to your Family Day event know the issues that are important to The American Legion. Tell them about our **Be the One program and our efforts to de-stigmatize the courageous decision to seek mental wellness**. Include an information table at your post so veterans know that resources and help are available to cover all kinds of needs through American Legion Charities and other great programs. Brochures can be downloaded at **legion.org/publications** and **betheone.org**.

Too many veterans take their lives while feeling isolated and alone. Some have no close relatives to whom they can reach out. It is a mistake for them to believe they have no family. Whether they know it or not, they have an American Legion Family. We care about them. Legionnaires have also worn the uniform of the U.S. military and many of us have endured similar experiences.

Veterans don't often advertise their personal crises. Prevention requires listening. Even trained professionals sometimes miss the signs. If you know a veteran who may be struggling, encourage a call to the 988 national crisis line. Follow up and ensure that the veteran knows that you are available as a friend and as a listener. In short, let him or her know that you are family.



HOW TO COMMEMORATE FOUR CHAPLAINS DAY

The American Legion Jan 12, 2023

Every year, American Legion posts nationwide commemorate the self-less acts of the Four Chaplains on or near Feb. 3, designated Four Chaplains Day by Congress in 1948.

On Feb. 3, 1943, the United States Army Transport Dorchester tragically sunk while crossing the North Atlantic, transporting troops to an American base in Greenland. A German U-boat fired a torpedo that struck the Dorchester, killing 672 of the 902 officers and enlisted men, merchant seamen and civilian workers aboard. Many of those survivors owe their lives to the courage and leadership exhibited by four chaplains of different faiths, who, in sacrificing their lives, created a unique legacy of brotherhood.

As soldiers rushed to lifeboats, Reverend George Fox (Methodist), Jewish Rabbi Alexander Goode, Reverend Clark Poling (Dutch Reformed) and Father John Washington (Roman Catholic) comforted the wounded and directed others to safety. One survivor watched the chaplains distribute life jackets, and when they ran out, they removed theirs and gave them to four young men.

As the Dorchester sank, the chaplains were seen linked arm in arm, praying.

The following is an example of how to conduct a Four Chaplain's service. Additional information is available in our **Four Chaplains Sunday guide**.

Location: The service can be held at a post, fraternal hall, auditorium, church, synagogue or chapel.

Media: Spread the word about your Four Chaplains service through local newspapers, radio and TV stations, and social media. Encourage reporters to write about the upcoming service or to do a follow-up story.

Program: Printed programs add to the dignity and importance of the occasion.

Suggested format:

- Posting of the colors
- Pledge of Allegiance
- "America the Beautiful" (assembly or solo)
- Welcome
- Invocation
- Introduction of guests
- Message (focused on the Four Chaplains & sacrificial service)
- Tributes to the Four Chaplains (wreath laying or candle lighting by four clergy, one of each faith)
- "Let There Be Peace on Earth" (assembly)
- Benediction
- Retirement of colors

To symbolize the tragic sinking of the Dorchester, there can be any number of focal points for the service such as four lifejackets or four empty seats.

FIVE THINGS TO KNOW, JAN. 17, 2023

US

The American Legion JAN 16, 2023

- 1. Starting Jan. 17, veterans in acute suicidal crisis will be able to go to any VA or non-VA health care facility for emergency health care at no cost—including inpatient or crisis residential care for up to 30 days and outpatient care for up to 90 days. Veterans do not need to be enrolled in the VA system to use this benefit. This expansion of care will help prevent veteran suicide by guaranteeing no cost, world-class care to veterans in times of crisis. It will also increase access to acute suicide care for up to 9 million veterans who are not currently enrolled in VA
- 2. The U.S. military's new, expanded combat training of Ukrainian forces began in Germany on Sunday, with a goal of getting a battalion of about 500 troops back on the battlefield to fight the Russians in the next five to eight weeks, said Gen. Mark Milley, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff.
- 3. The death toll from a weekend Russian missile strike on an apartment building in the southeastern Ukrainian city of Dnipro has risen to 37, authorities said Monday, as Western analysts pointed to signs indicating the Kremlin was preparing for a drawn-out war in Ukraine after almost 11 months of fighting.
- 4. Feb. 1 benefits checks won't have the so-called "widow's tax" reducing income for the surviving spouses of military retirees who participate in two programs. Until 2020, survivors couldn't receive the full amount of two survivor benefits at the same time. Under the rule known as the Survivor Benefit Plan "offset," the government reduced payments that were part of that program by the amount of Dependency and Indemnity Compensation that beneficiaries received from the Department of Veterans Affairs.
- 5. A portion of staff at Norfolk Naval Shipyard will be required to wear masks indoors on federal facilities again today for at least a week. The mandate was issued Saturday after the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention rated Portsmouth as an area with high community transmission of COVID. The shipyard said masks will be provided for those who need any.

Why Does Restarting Your Computer Help? Reasons to Restart Your Computer

- 1. Slowness or RAM Problems
- 2. Application Errors or Memory Leaks
- 3. Internet Connectivity
- 4. Performance Issues
- 5. Updates
- 1.Slowness or RAM Problems. One of the most common reasons to restart your computer is to clear the RAM cache. Your computer contains decades worth of technology advancements, one of those is called RAM. Without going into too much detail, RAM provides temporary storage for applications and programs as they run. Unfortunately, as they run, some of this data begins to pile up even though it's not being used. A restart can clear the RAM cache (unnecessary saved data) and have your computer back to work at full capacity.
- 2. Application Errors or Memory Leaks. Why does restarting your computer help? Because application developers are human, too, and sometimes the software they create can have some unintended side effects. A memory leak is one of these, where a program doesn't allow its unused memory to be overwritten. This can lead to slowness, like our first example, or even prevent the software from operating correctly. While a restart can't fix the leak itself, it may clear the cache associated with it.
- **3. Internet Connectivity.** Sometimes the Wi-Fi just doesn't work, try restarting! Network connectivity is another common reason to restart your computer. This can refresh the network settings for your computer without completely resetting them. It can be easy to get bogged down in all of your network settings, so try this before taking any additional, complex steps.
- **4. Performance Issues.**100% CPU usage? Is RAM full? Any idea what this means? Restart. Our computers are complex, and for the untrained individual, it could take hours to reach a solution. Restarting has the benefit of doing this for you. You may not know exactly what caused the issue, but there's a good chance a restart will clear it up.
- **5. Updates.** Your computer lives on patches and updates. Whether it's security, usability, or otherwise, the most recent updates are paramount to your computer operating as expected and are most likely one the first things your IT department will look at when you bring

a computer issue to them. Most of the time these updates download automatically but require a reboot to install. Recently downloaded updates are one of the most common reasons to restart your computer.

Other Things to Do

While there are many reasons to restart your computer, it's not just the only thing that can help save the day. Here are a few other tips to keep you secure and your work uninterrupted:

Lock Your Computer – If you step away for coffee or to speak to a coworker, it's best to lock your computer. If you're logged in, anyone on your computer can have free reign. Locking it provides one additional roadblock. It's as simple as pressing the "Windows Key + L" on Windows 10
