#### AMERICAN LEGION MULTI-YEAR MEMBERSHIP IS HERE

The American Legion Dec 04, 2023

E liminate the yearly hassle of remembering to renew your American Legion membership by taking advantage of the new multiyear membership available to current and potential members. Legionnaires needing to renew for 2024 or veterans joining the organization for the first time can lock-in a three-year membership by visiting <u>legion.org/renew</u> / <u>legion.org/join</u>.

A multiyear membership was approved by the National Executive Committee of The American Legion during the organization's Spring Meetings last May. Resolution 1: Purchase of Multiple Years of Membership approves "a five-year pilot program offering the purchase of three consecutive 12-month member terms at the then current dues rate."

#### Here is what you need to know about the threeyear membership:

- Multiyear membership sign-up is only available on the national American Legion website. Current or potential members cannot renew or join for a three-year membership at the post level or thru MyLegion.org.
- Renew now with a three-year membership by visiting <u>legion.org/renew</u>.
- Join now with a three-year membership by visiting <u>legion.org/join.</u>
- Legionnaires already renewed for 2024, can now take advantage of the multiyear membership starting with the 2025 membership year.
- Payment for the three-year membership will be upfront.
- > There is not a discounted rate with the three-year membership.
- Membership cards will still be sent annually by Legion posts.
- Those who sign up for a multiyear membership will not receive a renewal notice during the time they have signed up for the multiyear membership.

Please note that the multiyear membership will work just like PUFL. Whatever rate the member renews at is the what the post/department/national will receive for the duration of that timeframe. For example, if a member renews today (before national per-capita \$5 dues increase come July 1, 2024), National will receive \$18.50 for the next three years. Let's say the department's per capita is currently \$10 and is going to raise to \$15 come July 1, 2024. The department will receive the \$10 for the next three years. Once the member renews after the three year renewal is up, the renewal rate will adjust to the rate at that time.

#### ONE YEAR, \$18.8 BILLION IN VETERANS BENEFITS CLAIMS The American Legion



JAN 24, 2024 There are more than 18 billion reasons why our

nation's veterans gave thanks to The American Legion during Fiscal Year 2023, which ended in September.

That's because American Legion accredited service officers secured nearly 19 billion dollars – \$18,800,997,141.62 to be precise — in benefits claims for veterans. That amount exceeds the \$16 billion that veterans received in the previous fiscal year.

Three sites secured more than \$1 billion in FY 2023:

• St. Petersburg, Fla., \$2.4 billion.

- Columbia, S.C., \$1.1 billion.
- Montgomery, Ala., \$1.1 billion.

Also, in the most recent fiscal year, the Legion's Board of Veterans' Appeals Unit represented more than 11,234 appellants – helping them to secure more than \$89,616,242 in retroactive VA claims benefits.

The American Legion's 3,000 accredited service officers provide this expertise at no cost to any veteran, whether they are a Legionnaire or not. Some organizations charge for this service but do not get better results.

"I could not be more pleased with the extraordinary and selfless work of our team of service officers," American Legion National Commander Daniel J. Seehafer said. "This represents one of the core values of our organization: assisting our brothers and sisters. It is, in fact, a value that changes lives and saves lives."

#### **More Eligibility Questions**

- Q. I'm currently in the National Guard/Reserve. My unit was activated under Title 10 orders during a qualifying time period. Am I eligible?
- A. Yes, you are a veteran. Title 10 orders are issued by the Secretary of Defense and therefore are federal orders.
- Q. My National Guard unit was activated for crowd control under Title 32 orders during one of the qualifying periods. Am I eligible?
- A. No. Title 32 orders are issued under a governor's authority, whereas Title 10 orders are issued from the Secretary of Defense.
- Q. I'm currently a cadet at one of the U.S. Military Academies. Am I eligible?
- A. Yes, you are a veteran. The American Legion has considered service in the military academies as eligible for membership since WWI.
- Q. Can I be an honorary or social member of The American Legion?
- A. No. Per National Constitution and By-laws, no form or class of membership is authorized except regular active or paid up for life.
- Q. I served my entire military career in the National Guard/Reserves, and only have a DD214 from my Active Duty for Training that I was in during one of the qualifying dates. Am I eligible?
- A. Yes, you are a veteran. In the mid-60s all basic training and occupational training schools were considered federal active duty service.

#### LEGIONNAIRES ENCOURAGED TO ENGAGE IN PROMOTING VOTING BUT REMAIN NON-POLITICAL DURING ELECTION CYCLE

This year ushers in a presidential election. And while American Legion posts are encouraged to promote <u>"Get Out the Vote" (GOTV) efforts</u>, it is important to remember to remain nonpartisan in the process.

The American Legion is a nonpolitical, nonpartisan organization but advocates for all U.S. citizens to register and vote in all elections. The American Legion does not show preference for or against any particular candidate or political party.

With that mind, here are some dos and don'ts for Legionnaires and posts to follow during the election cycle.

1. Can I wear my American Legion cap to a political event? No. The American Legion cap is considered the official legion uniform (see p. 38 of 2024 Officer's Guide). If attending a political event, The American Legion cap, or any clothing with The American Legion emblem visible, must be removed so as not to imply any endorsement by The American Legion.

2. Can we use our American Legion post for a political event? When using post facilities to host any candidates, the post must remove American Legion emblems and American Legion flags to avoid any impression of endorsements. Candidates for all parties must be presented equal opportunity to use the facilities on the same terms and conditions as other competing candidates.

3. Can I get The American Legion at the local, state and national level to support a candidate running for Congress or any political office? No. In Article II, Section 2, of the Constitution of The American Legion, "The American Legion shall be absolutely nonpolitical and shall not be used for the dissemination of partisan principles nor for the promotion of the candidacy of any person seeking public office or preferment." Additionally, the National Charter, approved by Congress, stipulates The American Legion as an organization is nonpolitical. Therefore, The American Legion as an organization is never to help or endorse a candidate. However, you, as a private citizen and not speaking for the organization, can do whatever is legal and ethical to advance his/her candidacy.

#### This is The Right Way to Charge Your Phone

For all the ease and convenience of smartphones, they sure can cause a headache.

Here's a shortlist of updated tips and ideas for getting the best performance from your phone's battery. Don't worry, it's actually pretty easy!

#### Make the Switch to USB-C

If you've bought a phone or tablet in the last year or two, you may already be familiar with the latest-andgreatest charging device, the USB-C.

Like its predecessors, USBs A and C, the USB-C cable attaches to a "brick" adapter that plugs into a wall socket. However, either end of the cable can plug into your phone or into the brick, unlike previous generations, and it charges fast.

Like, really fast. The New York Times tested it out on iPhones in 2019, and found that an 18-watt USB-C charger sent a dead phone from 0% power to 80% in an hour. Pretty great if you've been stuck with the lower-wattage USB-A or B chargers for a while.

#### It's OK to Charge Overnight-For the Most Part

Modern phone batteries can't get "overloaded" with charge, so charging your phone overnight is fine. Phones will stop accepting charge once the battery has reached 100%.

However, it's not the best practice: When the battery inevitably drops down to 99%, the phone will recharge back up to 100%, and keep doing that, over and over, as long as it's plugged in. This ping-ponging is what can wear down the battery over time.

If you must be at full power in the morning, go for the overnight charge. But perhaps don't make it a nightly habit.

#### Aim for the Middle of the Charging Range

Rather than going from one extreme to the other, try to keep your phone's charge in the 50% to 80% range.

Lithium-ion batteries perform best when they're given shorter charges, rather than going all-or-none. Go ahead and give it a little nudge if the power is dwindling down into the 20% range - no need to send it skyrocketing back up to 100%.

Best of all, Androids and iPhones both come with settings that can manage your battery charge for you.

On iPhone it's called Optimized Battery Charging, and it's Adaptive Battery on Android. One less thing to worry about!

#### **Give Your Phone a Break**

Just as humans need rest and refreshment, so do smartphones.

Whether you're actively using it or not, your phone is always doing a little something in the background, slowly draining down power. Turning it off now and again saves some wear and tear on the battery. Not to mention that shutting down gives your phone a chance to cool off (heat is a battery killer).

How often you should do this is debatable. Some say you should do it once a day, others once a week, still others claim it's only necessary once a year. Whenever you get the urge, it's probably a fine idea - for the life of your phone's battery, and for a tiny tech vacation for you.

## How can a Veteran prepare before starting their application?

- Be sure to fill out their claim completely.
- Gather any evidence (supporting documents) they'll submit themselves when they file their VA disability claim. We encourage them to send in all their supporting documents along with their claim. This will help us process their claim quickly. <u>Learn about fully developed</u> <u>claims</u>
- Find out if they'll need to turn in any additional forms with their claim. Learn about additional forms Veterans may need to file

## What evidence does a Veteran need to support their claim?

They can support their VA disability claim by providing these documents:

- VA medical records and hospital records. These could relate to their claimed illnesses or injuries or they could show that their rated disability has gotten worse.
- **Private medical records and hospital reports.** These could relate to their claimed illnesses or inju- ries or they could show that their disability has gotten worse.
- **Supporting statements.** These could be from family members, friends, clergy members, law enforce- ment personnel, or people they served with. These statements could tell us more about their claimed condition and how and when it happened or how it got worse.

Depending on the type of claim a Veteran files, they may gather supporting documents themselves, or they can ask for our help to gather evidence. We'll also review their discharge papers (DD214 or other separation documents) and service treatment records.

#### Learn more about the evidence we'll need for their claim

## Does a Veteran need to submit evidence with their claim?

No. A Veteran doesn't have to submit any evidence to support their claim. But we may need to schedule a claim exam so we can learn more about their condition.

#### Learn more about VA claim exams (C&P exams)

A Veteran should also know that they have up to a year from the date we receive their claim to turn in any evidence. If they start their application and need time to gather more supporting documents, they can save their application and come back later to finish it. We'll recognize the date they started their application as their date of claim as long as they complete it within 365 days.

#### Should a Veteran submit an intent to file form?

If they plan to file for disability compensation using a paper form, they may want to submit an intent to file form first. This can give them the time they need to gather their evidence while avoiding a later potential start date (also called an effective date). When they notify us of their intent to file, they may be able to get retroactive payments (compensation that starts at a point in the past).

**Note:** If they file for disability compensation online, then they don't need to notify us of their intent to file. This is because their effective date gets set automatically when they start filling out the form online— before they submit it.

File a Veteran's claim by mail using an Application for Disability Compensation and Related Compensation Benefits (VA Form 21-526EZ).

## With the Help of a Trained Professional:

A Veteran can work with a trained professional called an accredited representative to get help filing a claim for disability compensation.

There are five Veterans Service Organizations located on the Togus Campus: American Legion, Disabled American Veterans, Maine Veterans' Services, Paralyzed Veterans of America, and Veterans of Foreign Wars

A Veteran doesn't need to do anything while they're waiting unless we send them a letter asking for more information. If we schedule exams for them, they should be sure not to miss them.
