\$16 BILLION FOR DISABLED VETERANS

Dear American Legion Family Members and Friends,

I am so proud of our American Legion service officers. They tirelessly assist veterans with their benefits claims, often guiding them through a complicated maze just to receive the compensation earned through their service.

Consider this: In fiscal year 2022 alone, veterans and other claimants represented by The American Legion received more than \$16 BILLION in VA benefits compensation. In the same fiscal year, the Legion's Board of Veterans' Appeals Unit represented more than 17,000 appellants — helping them to secure more than \$66 MILLION in retroactive VA claims benefits.

It's worth noting that our 3,000 accredited service officers provide this expertise at no cost to the veteran, whether they are a Legionnaire or not. Some organizations charge for this service but do not get better results.

There are countless success stories that we've heard – and many more that we have not. Veterans have received major adjustments in their disability ratings, significant increases in benefits and – perhaps best of all – the reassurance that someone cares enough to help them.

At this time, The American Legion has identified implementing what's outlined in the PACT Act as **one of our key legislative priorities**. We want to ensure that necessary oversight and proper funding are in place so that VA can fulfill its obligation. That means helping up to 3.5 million veterans affected by toxic contamination. VA has increased staffing to process the influx of new claims, adding nearly 1,900 newly authorized PACT Act positions to handle millions of new disability claims.

Already, more than 300,000 PACT Act claims have been filed since President Biden signed the law last August.

That is great news for our veterans who deserve coverage for their illnesses, injuries and ailments linked to toxic exposure. However, it also means that our service officers will face a significant increase in caseloads.

Let's support our service officers the best we can. I have no doubt that they will continue to serve our brothers and sisters with their gold standard of service that has already brought much needed assistance to millions of other veterans.

And, thank you for what you do to improve the lives of our fellow veterans, servicemembers and their families.

SPECIALLY ADAPTED HOMES FOR VETERANS TO BE BUILT IN YORK COUNTY, MAINE

Seacoast Land Acquisitions and Home Innovations are planning to build a number of Specially Adapted Homes (SAH) for severely injured Veterans from all conflicts who live in Maine and qualify according to Veterans Administration guidelines.

The single-family homes will be built in a small subdivision and will include a community center where Veterans and their families can gather for special events and socialization.

All applicants for SAH will have to apply to the Veterans Administration to determine their eligibility. In addition, special SAH grants are available to eligible Veterans to assist in the purchase of these homes. AVA approved lender will be able to provide additional financing for the purchase of these homes, if needed.

LEGION TESTIFYING THREE TIMES THIS WEEK ON CAPITOL HILL

The American Legion MAR 27, 2023

The American Legion will be testifying this week on a variety of bills pending before Congress. They include:

- American Legion Legislative Director Lawrence Montreuil will testify before the House Veterans' Affairs Subcommittee on Disability Assistance and Memorial Affairs to discuss legislation regarding disability benefits, survivor benefits and outreach. This will also include H.R. 1139, the "Governing Unaccredited Representatives Defrauding (GUARD) VA Benefits Act," which would reinstate penalties for people charging veterans unauthorized fees relating to claims for benefits. The hearing begins at 10:30 a.m. on Wednesday.
- American Legion Veterans Affairs & Rehabilitation Director Tiffany Ellett will testify before the HVAC Subcommittee on Health on a series of bills related to veterans health care. Those include H.R. 808, the Veterans Patient Advocacy Act. The availability of patient advocates is a priority of The American Legion and will continue to be a focal point when speaking with veterans about their representation as a VA patient. The hearing begins at 1:30 p.m. Wednesday.
- Matthew Brennan, a policy analyst in the Legion's Veterans Employment and Education Division, will testify on a series of bills during a House Subcommittee on Economic Opportunity Subcommittee hearing. Among the bills is one that would ensure that veterans who receive VA educational financial assistance would not be held liable if their college shuts down due to fraud. The hearing begins at 9:30 a.m. Thursday.

Why Is It So Important for Me to Update the Operating System?

Your computer keeps nagging you to restart. An annoying screen pops up to alert you that the system upgrade is complete. But to make sure you're safe, you need to shut off then start up your computer. Why all the hassle? Why should you have to close all your apps just to update the operating system? A company survey found that 80% of data breaches could have been prevented by updating the OS. Over half use legacy systems that have no current support. As a result, malware and ransomware attacks increase, causing huge financial losses.

What Is an Operating System?

The operating system is the main software that lets you browse the web, type with your keyboard, or draft a document. Microsoft Windows is the most recognizable OS and has 77% of the global desktop market share. And if you use an Apple computer, the OS is called macOS. Both operating systems go back decades and every so often Microsoft and Apple release new versions.

The latest version of Microsoft's OS is Windows 10. Apple users have macOS 10.15, also known as Catalina. And the tech giants want you on the latest platform if possible. Why? Because it's easier to patch or upgrade newer versions than old, obsolete ones.

What Are Operating System Upgrades?

An upgrade or patch fixes issues in your current operating system and keeps things current. You might have heard of service packs, security updates, and driver patches. These are examples of OS system upgrades that are necessary to maintain your computer's stability.

Some Upgrades are Tagged as Critical.

As you can imagine, a delay in downloading and installing them could leave your computer open to a digital attack. Some fix problems with your printer or peripherals. By dismissing the update, your devices may stop working correctly.

So why do people hate the system update process and tend to ignore the warnings?

Dangers of Ignoring Updates

If you're a Windows 10 user you already know the reason why updating the OS can be a nuisance. Some patches or service packs require you to restart. The OS schedules this to happen when you're not using the computer, like late at night. Sounds ideal. Except it forces the computer to shut down, closing all your windows and apps in the process. Any unsaved work gets lost and your web browsing sessions need to start again.

MILITARY HOLIDAYS AND OBSERVANCES IN APRIL



Gold Star Spouses (April 5th): "Gold Star Families" or "Gold Star Spouses" are terms that traditionally refer to the surviving loved ones of military members who have been killed in the line of duty and/or in combat. Gold Star Spouses Day was created to honor these loved ones who have sacrificed so much.

The Gold Star tradition began in World War I. During that time families with someone serving in the military flew flags with blue stars representing each family member currently serving. When a member was killed in the war, the star was changed to gold to let the community know the sacrifice that family had made. This tradition has evolved to include wearing a Gold Star lapel pin that is awarded by the military to the surviving family members.

The designation of Gold Star Spouses day in 2010 not only recognizes the sacrifices made by these military spouses. It is also a day of remembrance, a memorial for the fallen, and appreciation for those who might be in danger of being overlooked for their service and sacrifice for our country. Many military installations will hold their own events to acknowledge Gold Star Spouses Day. You should also check out the many different ways this day is honored and recognized on social media.

National Former POW Recognition Day (April 9th) April 9th is designated as National Former POW Recognition Day. While this day might not be as well-known as National POW/MIA Recognition Day, it is every bit as important. The focus of this day is the word "former". One well known former POW is the late Senator John McCain. His memory and the memory of the others who returned home from POW camps is on the minds of those who acknowledge this day. There are many troops who are still unaccounted for whose sacrifice and memory should be honored today as well.

National Former POW Recognition Day was originally designated in 1987 by President Ronald Reagan. Its conception was to honor the surrender of between 60 and 80,000 US and Filipino service members to the Japanese army at the Bataan Peninsula, Philippines on April 9, 1942.

More commonly known as the **Bataan Death March**, April 9, 1942, is the day the Japanese army began to force-march the American and Filipino POWs the 65 miles from Mariveles in the Bataan Peninsula to the train station at San Fernando. It is estimated that during this time over 20,000 men died. The POWs were beaten, robbed, starved, tortured, denied medical care, and executed by the Japanese forces.

While the original intent for this day was to recognize those men from that march in 1942, over the decades the recognition has expanded greatly to include all former POWs.

Air Force Reserve Birthday (April 14th) The Air Force Reserve was created on April 14, 1948, shortly after the Air Force was established as a separate branch of the military. The Air Force Reserve has approximately 450 aircraft. Their focus, however, is much more than solely air missions. Their mission also includes security, medical, civil engineering, space-force type operations, among other things.

Reservists of all branches play an important role in the DOD's strategy for manpower, military flexibility, and global reach. Since 9/11 the Air Force Reserve has played a major role in the air combat patrol missions in American airspace. Currently, there are more than 70,000 Americans serving the Air Force Reserve worldwide.

Army Reserve Birthday (April 23rd) Each year on April 23rd the Army Reserve celebrates its inception as well as its contributions to two World Wars, the Cold War, Korea, Vietnam, the Persian Gulf War, and countless other missions.

The Army Reserve provides combat support, peace-keeping, and civil support. Army Reservists today rotate between active duty mobilizations and monthly training. The Army Reserve Command believes that the need for these reserve troops is more critical now than it has been before. In a world of persistent threats and terrorism, the Army Reserve continues to play an important role in nation-building, humanitarian outreach, national defense, and combat missions.

National Military Brats Day (April 30th) April is the Month of the Military Child, so it seems fitting that the last day of the month would be set aside to celebrate Military Brats. The term "military brat" is a long-standing phrase used to describe the children of military members. While it can be used in a derogatory way, over the decades it has mostly become a way to self-identify as a military family member.

According to some, Military Brats, Inc created Military Brats Day in 2016. It has been celebrated on April 30th ever since its inception. The idea behind its inception was to set aside a day to acknowledge and thank these children – past and present – for the service and sacrifice they've made. There are even movements to try to get lawmakers to put it on the calendar as a national holiday.

Why not take the opportunity to acknowledge a military brat in your life?
