STAYING ON TOP

Dear American Legion Family members and friends,

I have always been a guy who sees the glass as half-full, not half-empty. So, when it comes to our 2023 membership year, I'll start by celebrating the positive.

As of last week, The American Legion welcomed 77,074 new members to posts across the country and overseas. This exceeds the goal of 75,000 new members that I called for during my election on Sept. 1, 2022. There are still a few days left in this membership year, so I strongly encourage our posts to cross the finish line with a sprint rather than a stroll. Here is an easy opportunity to join online.

Notice I said "glass half-full." On the flipside of this great growth of new members, our renewal rate needs dramatic improvement.

There are 172,850 members who paid dues to their posts in 2022 but have not yet renewed. At the department headquarters level, we have 21,343 non-renewals. The American Legion recognizes that every year some members will pass away and join post everlasting. This is why we set our renewal goal at 90%, instead of 100%. Even so, our current retention rate is 88.65%.

In theory, it's more difficult to recruit a new member than it is to keep an existing one. The existing member has already been convinced that The American Legion is worth joining. When people decide not to renew, chances are it's due to a lack of engagement from their posts and fellow Legionnaires. They at one time believed that The American Legion offered programs, advocacy, service and camaraderie which outweighed its reasonable annual dues. Or maybe they just need one more reminder, from you. <u>Online</u> <u>renewal is an easy click away.</u>

I absolutely believe that we can achieve 90% renewals through better engagement. If a post only reaches out to its members in the form of a renewal notice, the results will be predictable. Newsletters are nice, but phone calls and visits are even better. Let each and every veteran in your post know that they are valued members of your American Legion Family. Don't pressure people to go to meetings if they clearly have no desire to attend but let them know that you will always welcome their input and participation.

With more than 12,000 American Legion posts worldwide, not every post is a good fit for every Legionnaire. If conflicts or geographical issues are standing in the way, encourage the member to find a home at a post which is more convenient.

Don't listen to the naysayers who believe The American Legion is in decline. Major media outlets have been predicting our demise for over a half-century now. While the veterans population is significantly smaller than it was following the Vietnam War, The American Legion is still the nation's largest and most powerful veterans service organization. Let's keep it that way.

Across the country, in communities large and small, American Legion posts play an important role in celebrating the nation's independence. In Indianapolis, American Legion Mall is the site of the city's main downtown fireworks show. The Newport Harbor, Calif., Post 291 Yacht Club is gearing up for its annual "Old Glory Boat Parade" on July 4. Hundreds of other communities enlist help from Legionnaires to put on their celebrations.

Fourth of July feeds, parades and celebrations frequently culminate with fireworks shows that light up the skies and produce bangs and booms. For veterans coping with post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD), those displays can be a problem.

"As beautiful as they are, the sounds, smells and shockwaves of fireworks can be triggering for veterans with PTSD," said Annie Tang, a staff psychologist at Edward Hines Jr. VA Hospital in Chicago. "These can bring up emotional and physiological reactions, and bring up trauma memories from the past, which can bring up intense anxiety and fear."

Blanton-Thompson American Legion Post 155 in Crystal River, Fla., is offering its second annual "Escape the Fireworks" alternative event with music, food and beverages and no explosions, flashes or fire. The event was established last year following the suicide of a local veteran whose PTSD was presumed to have been triggered by fireworks explosions after Fourth of July displays.

VA's National Center for PTSD reports that Fourth of July events can trigger combat trauma. "Even though fireworks are meant to entertain us, it is not uncommon for the sounds, intense light or smells to cause distress," <u>VA states on the center's website.</u> "Those who have gone through a trauma that included explosions, gunfire, loud noises or fire may be more likely to find fireworks to be a reminder – a trigger or cue – of such past events."

WSBT 22 in Traverse City, Mich., reported in 2021 that for some veterans, it is not the scheduled fireworks shows that trigger PTSD "or even the days surrounding it. It's the ones that randomly go off weeks before expected." In some communities, signs are placed in yards to alert neighbors to be considerate of veterans who may have difficulty with 4th of July explosions and flashes.

The Montana VA Health Care System offered some tips and resources for veterans with PTSD who are concerned about the effects of the Fourth of July:

- If fireworks impact you, reach out to your loved ones and support systems. Let them know that you will need them to check in and be there for you.

- Veterans in crisis and those concerned about them can call the Veterans Crisis Line at 988 (press 1) to talk with qualified responders or visit veteranscrisisline.net.

- Veterans experiencing PTSD can access a free app on their smartphones called PTSD Coach, which includes coping mechanisms for PTSD.

★ Earplugs, headphones and white noise machines can help block out the noise of fireworks. Consider heading out of town to quieter places or where fireworks are not allowed.

PROTECT YOURSELF FROM AI SENIOR SCAMS

Artificial intelligence (AI) is advancing rapidly and will have dramatic effects on society. While AI has potential benefits in many areas, including health care and education, there are also potential drawbacks. Haywood Talcove, chief executive of a major cybersecurity organization, cautions seniors that new AI capabilities are being used for romance scams, ransom efforts, and IRS or government collection scams.

Talcove stated, "You have all of these people building this technology for good and they are working really, really hard. And you have another group working equally hard at applying their craft on the bad side." The bad actors use AI to enhance their scams and victimize seniors. Many scams have taken millions of dollars from seniors who did not protect themselves from romance scams, requests for ransom or false claims that they owe payments to the IRS.

Romance Scams The new AI capabilities enable a scammer to create a visual image that appears to be real. The scammer can also craft a voice designed to appeal to a specific victim. The lifelike image and voice will encourage the victim to go on video dates. After the visual image and false voice have built a relationship with the victim, there will be the inevitable request for money.

Ransom Attacks Many individuals have short videos with their voice on various social media outlets. A fraudster can use a short recording to build a realistic duplicate of that voice. The scammer may use the voice of a child, grandchild or other family member and

create a conversation using their voice. Most individuals cannot tell that this is not their actual relative. The voice will claim that the relative is in serious trouble and must receive immediate funds to be rescued.

IRS Collection Letters While many scammers have been using both letters and phone calls to impersonate the IRS and fraudulently collect funds, AI capabilities greatly enhance the power of the letters. Many current AI systems can generate very realistic letters. While previous scammer letters often had typographical or grammatical errors that allowed them to be easily identified, the AI-enhanced letters look very realistic. Talcove stated, "It is very, very hard to tell. It is going to take a while for people to become aware of "something like ChatGPT." He warns seniors not to send money to anyone you have not met in person.

It is important to understand the best ways to protect yourself. As Lori Mars, deputy director of the National Center on Elder Abuse, notes, "Older people are definitely targeted. The overall concept is that everyone is vulnerable. But with age can come mild cognitive impairment that is associated with poor financial decision making, as well as social isolation and loneliness."

While most financial abuse of elders is not reported, AARP estimates that individuals over 60 lose more than \$28 billion per year through elder exploitation. Approximately three-fourths of that loss is caused by an individual personally known to the senior, but the other types of scams may involve up to \$8 billion per year.

There are several practical tips for protecting yourself. If you receive a ransom phone call from someone claiming to be a relative, ask for specific identifying marks on their person or a special family password. Note that the IRS or other government agencies do not request payments through phone calls or email.

An excellent protection method is for a senior to have a trusted family member who will co-manage their accounts. If the senior is contacted by an individual requesting funds, they may then discuss the request with the family member. This is an excellent way to protect a senior person.

Finally, seniors are urged to have their Social Security or government checks directly deposited in bank accounts. They should not give any personal information over the phone to an unknown person. If a request for funds is made, ask the individual to send you a written request.

FED UP WITH HIGH MOBILE PHONE BILLS? TAKE A HARD LOOK AT WHAT YOU'RE PAYING FOR

As carrier costs rise 4% annually, Americans could see their yearly wireless bill reach \$2,100 within the next two years. But you may be paying for features you're not actually using.

Are you concerned about the monthly cost of your mobile plan? You're not alone: A recent report indicates that 86% of Americans are worried they're paying too much for their wireless plan—and they probably are.

<u>WhistleOut</u>, which makes a phone-plan search tool, surveyed 1,000 American adults who pay a phone bill. The results provide some insights into phoneplan overspending and offers a possible solution: switching to a <u>mobile virtual network operator</u> (MVNO).

Most Americans pay an average of \$160 a month for their wireless plans, or about \$2,000 per year. And with prices rising by an average of 4% annually, Americans could be seeing costs reaching \$2,100 in less than two years, WhistleOut says.

Nearly two-thirds (56%) of respondents use one of the three major providers—<u>T-Mobile</u>, <u>AT&T</u>, or <u>Verizon</u>. They often sell "unlimited data" plans to customers who primarily use their home Wi-Fi, so customers are paying an extra \$50 per month or \$600 per year for unused data. Only 13% use their plan's data at home, and 18% say they need to learn how to check their data usage.

When customers opt for an unlimited plan, they often perceive it as a beneficial arrangement. But according to <u>Statista</u>, the price per gigabyte has fallen 40% to \$2.75 from \$4.64 in 2018. And as that cost decreases, carriers incur higher expenses per plan. To compensate for this, carriers present unlimited plans at elevated prices, capitalizing on the fact that most customers don't closely monitor their data consumption.
