Dear American Legion Family members and friends,

When contemplating my first message as national commander of The American Legion, there was consistently one topic I wanted to address: our **Be the One initiative.**

Nothing is more important than our effort to reduce the number of veterans who die by suicide.

Seventeen, 22 or even more a day. Even one is one too many.

As I said in my acceptance speech last week, "... with all this talk about numbers on this very subject, the only number I want us to push is 'one,' as in Be the One to save one, yes, one veteran, or even their spouse, from taking his or her own life."

The life of one veteran saved makes all the difference in the world.

That gets to the heart of the Be the One mission. While the initiative was only launched two years ago, it is already starting to make a difference. I can feel the momentum. It's an honor to be part of this organization-wide effort.

You, too, can help build on this momentum to raise awareness about the issue, guide resources to those in need and eliminate the stigma sometimes associated with mental health counseling — all of which will contribute to reducing the veteran suicide rate.

Here are some ways that you and/or your post can play a vital role:

- Host a fitness-related event to raise awareness about Be the One, as well as improving one's physical and mental wellbeing. Posts across the nation have hosted 5K walk-runs and other similar events, **including this one** from my home state of Wisconsin.
- Put together a symposium or resource fair where local service providers can share their resources with veterans in your community. Posts in Illinois, Massachusetts and elsewhere have put on events like these to bring together veterans and those who can assist them with resources.
- Be creative and spread the word about Be the One in your communities, especially on Be the One days the first day of every month. And share how you are driving Be the One awareness by posting the story on our **Legiontown web page**.

Above all else, talk about it. Learn what to do when a fellow veteran needs help. And — above all else — Be the One..."

COMMANDER'S PROJECT 2023

Department Commander Al McKay asks that each Post and Legionnaire support his goal.



The American Legion, Department of Maine has a long history with the Maine Veterans' Cemeteries across the State. In 1960, The American Legion learned of a plan for joint State-Federal cemeteries, by State Convention in 1962 (in Old Orchard Beach), a resolution was passed attested by Department Adjutant Nathaniel Cobb. The resolution was to establish a Legion committee at the Maine Veterans Cemetery in Augusta since the burial space at Togus was closed. The Committee was tasked with finding land, deciding on building designs, placing flag poles, deciding on marker types, and working on getting legislation passed to support this massive project.

Fast forward to 2023 - A chapel that had stood at the well-established cemetery fell into disrepair and was torn down years ago. The committal building that replaced it is heavily utilized and in need of some massive structural renovations. The committal building is an essential tool needed to conduct an interment Service for our fallen comrades.

Commander McKay states "This is a very muchneeded building to provide a dignified space for our veterans, their spouses, and their families. The building renovations will allow protection from the elements year-round and ensure The American Legion, continuing with their Maine Veterans Memorial Cemetery history, remains a frontrunner in honoring all veterans who enter Post Everlasting".

Sunday marks the 22nd anniversary of the Sept. 11, 2001, terrorist attacks. It's a time in history that The American Legion will never forget.

For two decades, American Legion posts have conducted ceremonies on 9/11 to ensure that their communities don't forget the lives lost that day or those lost while fighting the global war on terrorism prompted by the attack. The American Legion wants to hear how posts are remembering the 22nd anniversary of Sept. 11. A few events already scheduled:

In New Jersey, Longport's annual 9/11 ceremony will be held 9 a.m. at Thomas B. Reed Park at the foot of the Longport bridge. Firefighters, police and members of American Legion Post 469 will place wreaths in memory of those lost in the 9/11 attacks, and those fighting the war on terror for many years after those attacks.

- ★ In Connecticut on Sept. 10, American Legion Post 48 will dedicate its memorial stone and plaque, Tribute to Freedom Monument, at the town marina at 11 a.m. The organization placed the monument last year to honor the personnel and everyday people who lost their lives on 9/11. The Freedom Monument pays tribute to the military, first responders, government employees, and ordinary citizens who, on 9/11 and thereafter, responded to the war on terror to ensure the preservation of our freedoms.
- ★ In Nebraska, A "Remember 9/11 Patriot's Walk" will take place Sept. 10, at 5 p.m. in Fuller Park, Albion. Sponsoring organizations are American Legion Post 162 and its entire American Legion Family, and VFW Post 736, their auxiliaries, Sons of The American Legion and the American Legion Riders. Everyone is encouraged to attend and honor the lives lost on 9/11.

Most smartwatches, regardless of price, offer basic health monitoring features like step counters and sleep trackers. Meanwhile, higher-end products can monitor heart rhythms and keep tabs on blood oxygen levels, among other more advanced metrics.

Size, Weight, Wearability and Comfort

Some smartwatches emphasize sleek, lightweight designs, so be sure to verify the weight of your desired device before purchasing. Read consumer reviews as well to learn about any potential issues with a smartwatch's band or fit.

Safety Features

If safety is a concern, look for a device that offers fall detection, reliable connectivity (including wellsupported apps that aren't prone to crashing) and emergency medical alerts.

Safety-minded shoppers may also want to ensure their smartwatch offers precise GPS tracking and seamless device syncing.

Final Thoughts

A smartwatch may not be right for everyone, but this increasingly ubiquitous wearable technology can enrich, enhance and possibly even save your life or the life of a loved one. Seniors, especially, can benefit from the safety and well-being features embedded in smartwatches.

But as with any device, it's all about finding something that offers the specific bells and whistles that meet your unique needs and preferences.



EIGHT TIPS TO MEMBERSHIP RECRUITING, RETENTION SUCCESS

As a Legionnaire, how many of you see a veteran and ask them, "Are you a veteran?"



"First mistake," said Terry Hanson from the Department of South Dakota during the National Membership Workshop recruitment and retention track last month. "Here is why I'm going to say that. Some National Guardsman don't consider themselves a veteran. (Instead) ask them, 'Did you serve in the military?' If they say yes, ask what branch. I start building a report. Because he might be an Army like I was. Build the report. Talk to them. Ask them, 'Do you know about The American Legion? We are the worlds largest veterans organization, and we are protecting your benefits.' That's what we're here for; that's what every one of us are here for to protect veterans serving veterans. That's what it's all about."

National Recruiter of the Year for 2024 Patricia Liddell of Georgia shared that she is always looking for veteran license plates or people wearing a military hat or shirt. Then "I ask them, 'Who is the veteran? Is it you, your wife, or both of you?' I'm always wearing an American Legion shirt. They ask me to tell them about the emblem. Tell me about The American Legion. I'll ask them, have you used the GI Bill? They'll say, 'Of course I used the GI Bill.' You wouldn't have the GI Bill without The American Legion. Then they'll say, 'Tell me how to join.'"

Other membership recruitment and retention best practices that were shared by Hanson and Laurie Bowman from the Department of Indiana include:

- Know what you're going to share with a potential new member about why they should join before you approach them.
- Know The American Legion programs they drive membership.
- Give post leadership names to the new member that you sign up.
- Take your recruit to their first post meeting.
- Sit down with new post members to <u>take the online</u> <u>Basic Training course</u>.
- Go where younger veterans are at youth sporting events. Ask the athletic directors if you can set up a membership table.
- Give special incentives for recruiting. In South Dakota, every time a Sons member recruits a Legion member they received a special Legion shirt. "The first day of our state convention, all SAL members who recruited a Legionnaire came to the general session wearing these green shirts. We had a sea of green; it was awesome to see," Hanson said.
- Conduct a new member initiation ceremony <u>found in the</u> Officer's Guide and Manual of Ceremonies book.
