TASK FORCE MOVEMENT: MORE THAN A JOB PROGRAM

Dear American Legion Family Members and Friends,
For many years, The American Legion has worked to help transitioning military personnel convert their experiences in uniform into credits to help them move quickly and effectively into civilian careers that require special licenses and credentials.

Many of those civilian careers are in serious need of qualified professionals. That need grew painfully clear during the COVID-19 pandemic, especially in such areas as commercial truck driving and nursing.

The American Legion is proud to have a place on the steering committee of [Task Force Movement](#), a White House initiative that unites key stakeholders from industry, education, labor, government and the military to help our nation fulfill two key objectives:

- Get the U.S. economy rolling again in areas of need that, if not adequately staffed, pose national security and public health threats.
- Help transitioning military personnel and veterans get into career fields that make the most of their training and can put them in jobs that pay well, offer good benefits and fulfill important purposes, all of which contribute substantially to good mental health and well-being.

Last August, during the 104th American Legion National Convention in Charlotte, N.C., [the committee met and announced an important new area of emphasis – health care](#). Look for new developments on that front in the months ahead. Task Force Movement was launched in April 2022 to speed up and ease the process for veterans to work in the commercial trucking industry, which now has some 80,000 vacancies. Five months later, [TFM added cybersecurity to its targeted industries](#), where some 70,000 jobs are available in government and perhaps 10 times that in the private sector.

The program proved successful in its first year, providing scholarships, apprenticeships and education waivers for veterans who had already proven their skills while in uniform. It's no easy endeavor to make this happen because different states and different industries in those states have different requirements to achieve certification. TFM has been working tirelessly with multiple stakeholders to break down barriers for veterans who are ready now to step into these careers in an economy starved for well-trained and capable employees who care about fulfilling important needs in the nation they swore with their lives to protect and defend.

By adding health care to its portfolio, TFM addresses a need The American Legion has listed among its highest priorities for the Department of Veterans

Affairs over the last decade – recruiting and retaining qualified health-care professionals, particularly nurses. The shortage of health-care professionals in the nation right now is estimated at nearly 2 million, so everyone in that industry is competing for talent, more of which is desperately needed.

To keep making progress, TFM looks to continue building its roster of partners from industry, government, education, charitable foundations that want to support the initiative and the veterans community. Online registration forms to get involved are available on the TFM website at taskforcemovement.org.

Most important, all stakeholders – including The American Legion – have a responsibility to close these labor gaps because understaffed hospitals, idled trucks and online vulnerabilities do not simply represent economic inconvenience; they threaten our national security.

COMMANDER'S PROJECT 2023

Department Commander Al McKay asks that each Post and Legionnaire support his goal.



The American Legion, Department of Maine has a long history with the Maine Veterans' Cemeteries across the State. In 1960, The American Legion learned of a plan for joint State-Federal cemeteries, by State Convention in 1962 (in Old Orchard Beach), a resolution was passed attested by Department Adjutant Nathaniel Cobb. The resolution was to establish a Legion committee at the Maine Veterans Cemetery in Augusta since the burial space at Togus was closed. The Committee was tasked with finding land, deciding on building designs, placing flag poles, deciding on marker types, and working on getting legislation passed to support this massive project.

Fast forward to 2023 - A chapel that had stood at the well-established cemetery fell into disrepair and was torn down years ago. The committal building that replaced it is heavily utilized and in need of some massive structural renovations. The committal building is an essential tool needed to conduct an interment Service for our fallen comrades.

Commander McKay states "This is a very much-needed building to provide a dignified space for our veterans, their spouses, and their families. The building renovations will allow protection from the elements year-round and ensure The American Legion, continuing with their Maine Veterans Memorial Cemetery history, remains a frontrunner in honoring all veterans who enter Post Everlasting".

VIETNAM WOMEN'S MEMORIAL TO MARK 30TH ANNIVERSARY

To commemorate the 30th anniversary of the dedication of the Vietnam Women's Memorial in Washington, D.C., a weekend of events will honor the 265,000 women veterans – military and civilian – who served during the Vietnam era.

Hosted by Eastern National in coordination with the Vietnam Women's Memorial Advisory Group, the National Park Service and the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund, programs will include a candlelight ceremony at 6 p.m. on Nov. 10 and a storytelling program at 10 a.m. on Veterans Day. The weekend will culminate in a 1 p.m. ceremony on Veterans Day at the memorial, where the annual Observance at the Wall will be dedicated to the anniversary.

The keynote speaker will be Diane Carlson Evans, chair of the Vietnam Women's Memorial Advisory Group and founder of the Vietnam Women's Memorial. A former Army combat nurse and Vietnam War veteran, she led a 10-year mission to build the memorial on the National Mall – the first in the nation's capital to recognize the military service of women, as well as the patriotic service of civilian women. In 2021, Carlson Evans received The American Legion's Distinguished Service Medal for her decades of veteran advocacy. She is a life member of Lewis & Clark Post 2 in Helena, Mont.

Anniversary events are open to the public and will be held at the Vietnam Veterans Memorial. The candlelight and storytelling programs will take place at the Vietnam Women's Memorial statue, 300 feet from the Wall. Smart TVs: What You Need to Know

If you're thinking of streaming - or already do - a smart TV could be for you. Smart televisions are made by a variety of manufacturers, including, but not limited to, those made by LG, Samsung, Panasonic, Sony, and Vizio.

What Is a Smart TV, Anyway? In a nutshell, a smart TV connects directly to the internet and incorporates an operating system/platform that lets you access, manage, and view online and network-based media content like Hulu or Netflix without the need to use an additional device such as a Roku or Fire Stick.

How Smart TVs Work. Smart TVs access online content by connecting to the same broadband router and Ethernet or Wi-Fi network you use to connect your computer to the internet. Ethernet provides the most stable connection, but if your TV is in a different room or a long distance from your router, Wi-Fi might be more convenient.

Once your TV is connected and turned on, you'll be prompted to enter any login information required by your internet service provider. The smart TV will display an on-screen menu that includes a list of available internet channels provided as apps (similar to the apps on a smartphone). Some apps come preloaded, and you can download more to add to the TV's app library.

How Do Smart TVs Work? When you click on the icon for a specific channel/app, you are taken to its content offerings, which you can select and view.

Exactly how you navigate through the smart TV menu and manage your apps varies with the brand and model.

The Benefit of Smart TVs. The main benefit of a smart TV is access to many channels that offer TV programs, movies, and music without the need to connect a TV antenna or subscribe to a cable/satellite service. Also, some smart TVs provide web browsing, gaming, and access to compatible media content stored on your computer.

Although smart TVs also can receive TV programming via antenna or cable/satellite, Vizio has actually taken the bold step of eliminating built-in tuners and antenna/cable connections on most of its sets in favor of its built-in streaming platform as an all-encompassing replacement.

A Few Things to Consider

The hype surrounding smart TVs is compelling, but there are some cost considerations and limitations to consider.

Although smart TV platforms provide access to many free channels and services, many require either a monthly subscription or a pay-per-view fee. When you start adding up those costs, you could end up spending as much, or more, than a monthly cable/satellite bill. On the other hand, you will be paying only for the channels and content you want.

The smart TV brand/model determines the services and features you can access. Although all smart TVs access a lot of the same core services (Netflix, Vudu, Hulu, Pandora), many additional and niche channels might not be accessible on some smart TV platforms.

Can Smart TVs Spy on You? Using a smart TV may result in privacy issues. Smart TVs and content app providers usually track your viewing habits to provide you with viewing suggestions. For example, every time you log into Netflix, the menu shows what you've watched recently, as well as updated suggestions for related movies or programs that you might like based on your 'watched recently' list.

You might think that this type of tracking is a good thing because it cuts search time for movies or programs to watch, but a smart TV might be doing more than track your viewing habits. If your smart TV has a webcam or voice control, there is a possibility that someone could hack in and see/hear you.

Also, any credit card purchases you make using your TV might be trackable by third parties. If your voice control or webcam is on, don't say or do anything that you wouldn't do or say in public—and be cautious with your online credit card purchases.

Do I need the internet to use a smart TV? Yes. Unless your TV supports antenna or cable/satellite television, you need an internet connection to watch TV. That said, you can still connect game consoles and DVD players, although you don't need a smart TV to use those devices.

Do smart TVs come with built-in Wi-Fi?

Yes, most of the time. Look for "Wi-Fi-enabled" in the product description to be sure. To connect your smart TV to Wi-Fi, go to the TV's welcome screen, search for available wireless networks, select your network, and enter the password.





Fall Conference 2023 Oratorical Briefing

IMPORTANT DATES AND LOCATIONS: The following are fixed dates, the District and Post need to fix their contest dates so these dates are met. There are **NO** exceptions.

1. **National has changed** their contest dates to May 17-19, 2024. **National has changed** the location to Hillsdale College, 33 E College St, Hillsdale, MI 49242.
2. Department of Maine Certified winner is due to National by 5 pm on April 1, 2024 (Responsible, Department).
3. Department of Maine's contest is February 10, 2024, with a snow date of February 17, 2024. Location: Thomas College, 180 W River Rd, Waterville, ME 04901. Time: Candidates are asked to be in place by 8:00am, NLT 8:30am, there are briefings they need paperwork and they need time to settle in and be prepared.
4. Department Must receive your District winner NLT January 26, 2024.
5. Contestant applications are due to the Post NLT December 1, 2023. No exceptions.
6. Posts must coordinate with your District in order for you to meet the Districts level of competition. Even if there is only one contestant you must give the candidate the opportunity to practice at multiple levels.

SPEECHES: Oration is 8-10 minutes of their choice of the US Constitution. The Four Assigned Topics are 3-5 minutes. Candidates must be prepared for all four topics. Anything less than the minimum or over the maximum time creates a time penalty.

AWARDS: Posts and Districts set their own value to the winner/s. Department has their awards and certificates. National is a little different. There are approximately nine groups competing. The Winner/s cash awards are not given to the candidates. When the candidate choices the college/university they are attending the college/university is given the amount they have won.

PLEASE: Go to the Leadership Ledger and print a copy of all the documents listed. Read and review with your team. Write down any questions you may have and call me.

VOLUNTEERS: Positions available are: Judges, tabulators, room monitors, ushers and door guards.
