I have lost almost 300 games. On 26 occasions, I have been entrusted to take the game winning shot, and I missed. I have failed over and over and over again in my life. And that is why I

In my career with the American Legion I have had my share of failures.

Fail #1: At my Post a few years back, we were trying to imagine a fun and productive fundraiser to send more young men to Boys State. We tried to put a spin on March Madness and during March we would have a band every Friday night complete with giveaways, 50/50s, and other contests to raise the necessary funds. We advertised on social media, by email, in newsletters, and layered the Post with posters. The first Friday event, a large portion of the Post opted to go to Eustis for a snowmobile weekend. This left about 15 members in attendance. second Friday event we promoted even harder and had almost 20 members attend. Not much changed for the next two Friday events. A small, dedicated group raised enough funds to cover the overhead of the events with enough profit to cover 2 attendees to Boys State. The same number we send every year. I remember feeling deflated, I couldn't imagine advertising any more than we did. Lesson learned: get more buy in from members prior to events, ensure people will not be on a cruise, on the Saco River camping, or up north on snowmobiles.

Fail #2: I have witnessed a Sons of school roster of all time or his coach made The American Legion Squadron put on a meal, the ingredients alone were \$600 for this extravagant gumbo with crayfish, shrimp, scallops, lobster, etc. 10 people showed up at \$8 per person. The Son was embarrassed and covered the cost out of his own pocket. Lesson learned: KISS (Keep It Simple Stupid). We now know a simple spaghetti night, classic BBQ, or bean supper is a smaller investment with

bigger fundraising potential.

Fail #3: At a Flag Day ceremony, 10 minutes before standing in front of a crowd of spectators.....no Legion officers showed up to assist with ceremony. It's me and a few local Scouts. In 2 minutes, I took the ceremony that was in the Officers Guide and Manual of Ceremonies and hacked it down to me opening the ceremony, doing the prayer, inspecting flags, and the Scouts folding and disposing of flags properly in a burn pit. That was not the failing part, the observers were not familiar with a flag ceremony so they didn't see the mistakes. It was actually some of the pictures taken of the ceremony, one of the Scouts folding jobs on a flag was less than stellar. A community member loved the ceremony and opted to post on Facebook. The picture showed what appeared to be a balled-up flag thrown into the fire and not officially folded. The photographer meant no harm but it did infuriate a lot of people who saw the picture and that's when the angry emails and phone calls to complain began. Lesson learned: Utilize not only your Legion officers, but your Sons, Auxiliary, prominent members of the community, Scouts, etc. Again, the public does not know if you make a mistake at a ceremony, they are not aware of who is supposed to officially playing what roles. Be ready to adapt and push on.

There are many other examples of my failures in the past, there may be some failures in the future.

Don't be afraid to fail, that is how you learn. Don't get gun shy, keep trying.

On a weekly basis, you may have challenges at your Post. You are hesitant to do things because of past failures. It could be not knowing how to run a meeting, not knowing how to tackle finances at the Post, not knowing the order of flags at a ceremony. Many people ask how to set up a room for a committee meeting, a funeral, an installation, or a regular meeting. I also get the tougher calls on membership. disciplinary actions, personality differences and questions on post operations.

There are a few ways to handle those challenges and failures at the Post level. One is your By-Laws. If you haven't read the Post By-Laws recently (or ever in many cases), that is your official rules to live by. Now I understand that times change, and so can the By-Laws.

I recently had a post whose By-Laws stated that dues were \$5. When it has been over \$30 for many years. I had another and the By-Laws mandated the Post provide funding to American Legion Baseball, the town hadn't had a team in 30 years. A recent set of By-Laws allowed for a lounge closer you're getting to success. committee to spend up to \$2000 as they saw fit without approval from the Executive or House Committee, unfortunately

that Post has not had a bank account with \$2000 for many years.

Review your By-Laws, learn your By-Laws, and bring them up to date if need be.

Another way to avoid the potential of failure is 100 years of lessons, speeches, room set-ups, ceremonial scripts, procedure, and time tested information in the Officers Guide and Manual of Ceremonies. I have By-Laws on one side of my briefcase and a printed out copy of the Officers Guide. It has saved me on multiple occasions from embarrassment and more failure. 



PLEASE READ AND RESPOND TO YOUR MAIL FROM THE VA! APPEALS OF CLAIMS. The ap-

peals process is no longer the strict structure it was. If your decision was after Feb. 19, you fall under the AMA. There are now five lanes you can choose from. The first two are at the regional level. They are called supplemental review and higher-

The American Legion. Across the appeal directly to the Board of Veterans Appeals. They are direct, evidence only, and hearing. The time limit is now one year from each decision.

Contacting the DSO for Assistance by Telephone. Please just leave your name, phone number, and who you are working with.

Financial Assistance. Keep in mind that requests for financial needs should be directed to your town/city for general assistance (GA), and either a local Legion Post for a possible fundraiser or The American Legion Department Headquarters. In addition, we can make referrals to other service organizations, but we do not have the funds to pay rent, mortgage, credit card bills or other ongoing bills. If you have children, mention TFA to to see if you are eligible to apply.

VEFA was created to provide assistance for Maine Veterans who suffer an emergency and do not have sufficient savings or access to other financial assistance to resolve the emergency. Examples of assistance needs may include: damage to the Veteran's home due to fire, flood or hurricane that is not covered by insurance; illness of the Veteran or family member that results in hardship; assistance to prevent or resolve the Veteran being homeless; or any other condition that puts the Veteran at risk of not having the basic necessities of food, shelter and

MBVS conducted a Request for Proposal process and has now contracted with two providers, Easterseals Maine and the American Legion of Maine, to process requests for assistance, arrive at an appropriate decision on requests, and issue rapid financial assistance to help with a Maine Veteran's emergency

MBVS Director David Richmond stated the following:

"We are fortunate to have two proven, capable organizations step up to help us administer this program. 



In accordance with Article IV of the Constitution and By-laws of the Department of Maine, The American Legion, the one hundredth and one Annual Convention is hereby called to convene at Brewer, Maine, June 7-9, 2019.

The first business session will be called to order at 12:00 p.m. Daylight Savings Time, on the afternoon of Friday, June 7, 2019, with the final business session scheduled for Saturday morning, June 8, 2019, at 9:00 a.m. All general business sessions of the convention will be held at Jeff's Catering & Event Center, Brewer, Maine

PURPOSE

The convention is called for the purpose of electing Department Officers for the ensuing year; to elect delegates and alternates to the 2019 National Convention to be held in Indianapolis, Indiana; to re-ceive reports of all Department Officers and standing committees; to consider the resolutions and actions of subordinate bodies and to transact any other business properly brought before the convention.

REPRESENTATION

Each post is entitled to one delegate and one alternate, and one additional delegate and alternate for each one hundred members or fractional part thereof paid up to May 8, 2019. A post with less than 15 members is not entitled to any delegates. All department officers, district commanders, area commanders and Past Department Commanders, in good standing, shall be entitled to vote and have all the rights of delegates in the convention. 
