NDIANAPOLIS (April 13, 2020) -American Legion posts throughout the nation are reaching out to isolated veterans and their families through a Buddy Check program initiated in early 2019 that has helped thousands get through the current and ongoing coronavirus-COVID19 pandemic.

"If ever a veterans-service program was built for pandemic relief, it's the Buddy Check," American Legion Nation-al Commander James W. "Bill" Oxford said. "In communities large and small everywhere on the map, Buddy Checks are making big differences for veterans, their spouses and families. Hundreds of posts are reaching out in their local communities, especially to veterans whose age puts them at risk for infection. As with each year, the Department needs to maintain its revenue streams in order to continue to support its programs, as well as pay the office staff so they can contin-

ue to do their jobs. Those revenue streams include membership renewals and new members, our spring and holiday label programs, and sweepstakes programs. Your support for these fund raisers is definitely needed.

The American Legion, Department of Maine Foundation is a 501 (c) 3, so all business and corporation donations are 100% tax deductable. All donations to the Endowment are invested and the revenue generated is intended to be donated to the Department of Maine for its programs. To date, we have received approximately \$11,000 in donations. The Department of Maine Foundation's Board of Directors approved to invest \$10,400 of that amount in a CD (certificate of deposit) that will generate a higher level of interest than a final portion. The VA is still working claims, although some compensation and pension exams are not being done. Others are being done via telehealth. peals process is no longer the strict structure it was. If your decision was after Feb. 19, you fall under the AMA. There are now five lanes you can choose from. The first two are at the regional level. They are called supplemental review and higherlevel review. Then there are three ways to appeal directly to the Board of Veterans Appeals. They are direct, evidence only, and hearing. The time limit is now one year from each decision.

The CARES Act, passed by Congress in late March, includes support for veteran-owned small business, VA telehealth, and almost \$20 billion in funding to the VA. This funding will save the lives of veterans with COVID-19 and ensure that VA centers across the country have the funding they need to keep veterans safe during this time.

Also provided through the CARES Act, Americans earning up to \$75,000 should already have started receiving their direct economic impact payment of \$1,200. If a veteran receives VA benefits, they automatically receive their stimulus checks, no matter if they normally file taxes or not-which ensures that our most vulnerable veterans will not be left behind by bureaucratic red tape.

Actions taken in March secured student veterans full GI Bill payments during this time. The House has also passed legislation to ensure work study programs and housing payments will continue through the semester, even if the veteran is unable to attend or the college fully shuts down. That bill is waiting for the President's signature.
