

visit https://www.va.gov/health-care/ covid-19-vaccine/. Additionally, veterans can find their local VA health facility and its current plan by visiting https://www.va.gov/find-locations.

Due to a larger percentage of highrisk patients within the VA health-care system compared to the general public, it may take longer for veterans not at an increased risk to receive their hind providing access to VA health vaccine. In some instances, it may be faster for a veteran to receive a vaccine through their state rather than through VA. You can find information on your state's COVID-19 vaccine distribution plan here by visiting https:// www.cdc.gov/vaccines/covid-19/

"The American Legion has the utmost confidence in VA to balance the vaccine rollout, while prioritizing the most vulnerable veterans and healthcare providers," said Mario Marquez, director of The American Legion's Veteran Affairs & Rehabilitation Division. "VA has assured us they will provide this balance with site-specific resources, needs, availability and local status of the pandemic."

In order to be eligible to receive the COVID-19 vaccine through VA, a veteran must be enrolled in the VA health-care system. However, veterans attempting to enroll in VA health care for the first time who fall into category 8g, will not be eligible for the vaccine as they are also not currently eligible for VA health care. This is due to a VA change in policy

from 2003 which removed 8g eligibility as these veterans do not have a service-connected disability and their income exceeds the allotted amount to qualify for VA coverage.

The American Legion supports 8g reintegration into VA health care. At the 2016 National Convention, the National Executive Committee approved Resolution No. 2 that called for the reinstatement by VA.

"The American Legion stands becare to veterans regardless of their economic status," Jeff Steele, an associate in the National Legislative Division, told the House Committee on Veterans Affairs on Dec. 2, 2020.

The American Legion is also on record in recent testimony, supporting legislation that calls for standing up a bipartisan commission on veterans health-care eligibility and benefits design.

As more vaccines become available, VA plans to offer free COVID-19 vaccines to all veterans receiving VA health care who want one. If you are a veteran who is not currently enrolled or receiving health care through VA visit, https://www.va.gov/ <u>health-care/how-to-apply/</u> to apply.

To provide some relief during these challenging times, financial grants are now available for eligible American Legion posts.

Finally, currently the DOL's Bureau of Labor Statistics does not keep track of unemployment data for U.S. territories in the same manner that it does for the 50 states and the District of Columbia. As Resolution 13: Tracking of Veteran Unemployment in All U.S. Territories, The American Legion supports any legislation requiring the DOL's Bureau of Labor statistics to collect and publish data on veterans' unemployment rate regarding U.S. Territories in the same manner as those within federal agencies.

FY 2021 National **Defense Authorization Act**

As you are all aware by now, the House passed the FY 2021 National Defense Authorization Act on December 8, 2020. Though it was vetoed by President Trump, the House and the Senate came together and overrode the veto, ensuring this important bipartisan bill became law. The annual NDAA is a true compromise bill, and it isn't perfect, but this year it includes several priorities that will benefit our state and nation. In Maine, passage of the NDAA authorizes the shipbuilding work at BIW and ensures our naval fleet is strong. The final legislation included support for survivors of military sexual trauma, and Agent Orange benefits for veterans.

The final NDAA provides long-overdue benefits for veterans exposed to Agent Orange. It requires the VA to make a presumption of service connection for exposure to Agent Orange for veterans who were later diagnosed with bladder cancer, Parkinsonism or hypothyroidism. ually assaulted at a VA facility. I heard from many of you in support of this change, and I'm pleased rizes a 3.0 percent increase in basic Congress responded to the Legion's advocacy to ensure this provision was included in the final law.

I also celebrated the enactment of another Legion priority, the Deborah Sampson Act, which creates an Office of Women's Health within the Veterans Health Administration to oversee women's health programs and mandates that every VA healthcare facility has a women's health primary care provider, among other provisions to help women veterans.

This important bill was included within a comprehensive veterans' bill, called the Johnny Isakson and David P. Roe, M.D. Veterans Health Care and Benefits Improvements Act,

The VA is now required to establish specialized teams to process claims for compensation for a covered mental health condition based on military sexual trauma, and must also make an annual report to Congress on military sexual trauma claims. I still believe we need better leadership on the issue of military sexual trauma at the VA, and I join you in condemning Secretary Wilkie's retaliation against a veteran who claims she was sex-

The FY2021 NDAA also authopay for service members, ensures parental leave for federal employees, strengthens equal employment opportunity protections for federal employees, provides child care for military families and DOD employees, and gives Gold Star Families National Parks passes. These are important provisions that will make a huge impact for military families in Maine and across the country. I'm proud that Congress was able to ensure we enacted this piece of essential legislation, and I'm glad to have heard often from my constituents and members of the Legion along the way. 





the sun shone bright with a temperature of 68 degrees. On that morning, at the 11th hour, the bell in the tower of the by a group of fur trappers from New Old Church on the Hill (AKA Union Church), built between 1832 and 1834 in Buckfield, rang forth. It was sounded by Nick Hart, son of John D. Long Post 58 member (and District 5 Sgt.at-Arms) Ralph Hart, who employed a short wooden pole called a "hammer" to elicit from the bell its clarion sound heard throughout town. Moments before, there assembled below the church a dedicated group of patriots comprised of Post Chaplain Bill Rice, 61 year member Merton Jones, Post Commander James Lowell (also District 5 Commander), Post Adjutant Gloria Hall (also District 5 Americanism Officer), and Church lady Sandra Perkins. Following the ringing, Post members adjourned to the Town's Veterans Monument, where

Jednesday the 11th of November, Chaplain Rice offered, in the parlance 2020, belied its being Autumn, as of their Revolutionary War ancestors, "a Lesson."

Buckfield was first settled in 1776 Gloucester, Maine, led by Abijah and Nathaniel Buck, in whose company was also Thomas Allen, John Brown, and perhaps others. Of that company, Thomas Allen, a deserter from his Britannic Majesty's 29th Regiment of Foote, transformed into a patriot on March 5, 1770, at the "Boston Massacre," gave good service to his adopted country in the conflict for Independence that raged from 1775 to 1783. Some of those who settled initially in Buckfield, incorporated in 1793 by the Great and General Court of Massachusetts, moved on to settle other villages and towns further west in Oxford County.

Governor (1880-83), of Massachusetts, who was later elected a Congressman from the Maine's 2nd District, serving until 1889. A friend of President William McKinley, Long was chosen to be his Secretary of the Navy, the 34th to serve the United States in that capacity,

from March 6, 1897 to April 10, 1902 (during the Spanish-American War). It was Long who ordered the USS Maine to Havana Harbor in January 1898 as a matter of customary relations, and out of concern for the safety of American citizens residing in Cuba, which was then experiencing a War of Independence. And the rest, as the saying goes, "is History".

Ring-McKeen Post 151 Veterans Day Ceremonies

West Paris Ring-McKeen Post 151 mostly formed out of Jackson-Silver Veterans Monument to hold their Veteran Day ceremonies. Though West Paris was not incorporated out of Paris, Maine, until 1957, it was granted as a bonus from the Great and General Court of Massachusetts in 1771, to Captain Joshua Fuller and his Company of 64 soldiers, in gratitude for their service in the French and Indian War, and was settled in 1779. Thus it is a fitting place to honor the service of those who served the Nation in the Armed Forces of the United States.

The Post was chartered following WWII on November 5, 1945, being



members gathered at the Town Post 68, with which they have since enjoyed a cordial, mutually supporting, relationship. West Paris had contributed many a Post 68 Commander, as well as other officers and serving members from 1919 to their date of separation. It is recorded in Post 68 records that when Jackson-Silver held its meetings in the former Albany schoolhouse that had been moved to Locke Mills, at 20:00 (8:00 pm) hours, West Paris members at Post 68 meetings would keep a sharp eye on the nearby train station, as they had to board the last commuter to West Paris in order to get home.


