

District Commanders, remember you are the first line of defense against troubled Posts. During your Post visits, use the Post Audit as a tool and sit with the Post Officers before or after their meeting to discuss the audit. This tool will help you identify problems/

issues occurring at the Post and help create a path to correct those issues. Usually by the time Department hears about a Post in trouble, it is too late. Revitalization needs to happen as soon as possible. More and more Posts, for some reason, think they can sell their Post and the last member standing gets the rest. Not so, refer to the Department's Constitution & By-Laws for guidelines as follows:

ARTICLE XX: In addition to other legal requirements under existing laws, and the Department of Maine, no Post, District, or any other holding company, or corporation subordinate thereto, shall purchase, sell or otherwise transfer title or interest in any real estate or private property which is equal to twenty-five percent (25%) or more of Posts or Districts net worth unless written notice of such proposal has first been:

(1) Submitted thirty (30) days prior partment Executive Committee shall review any sale, purchase, transfer, or encumbrances to determine whether such transactions serve the purposes of the Post, District, Department of The American Legion as prescribed in the National and Department By-Laws and Constitution. The Department Executive Committee will also determine if it is in the best interest of The American Legion to involve the Post Revitalization team to help the Post or District through a difficult process, and second-

(2) Each member of said Post, District is given a minimum of thirty (30) days notice prior such regular meeting or special meeting at which the proposal is to be considered, and then will require a two-thirds (2/3) vote of those present at said meeting to approve. Failure to comply with these provisions shall nullify said transaction. (Res. 02-

Post Commander/Adjutants will receive the 'Annual Post Data Report' form from Department. This report is due back to Department in April. This is one of four reports that have to be completed and sent to Department each year. The following is a breakdown of each report. Annual Post Data Report - This form shows all post information currently on file at National and Department HQ. Please review and make any necessary changes or corrections and submit to Department HQ. The due date for this form

will be included in the letter that accompanies this form. Reminder: the Annual Post Data Report is not available online.

Consolidated Post Report (CPR) -There are two ways to submit this form. You can go to the website mylegion.org or submit by mail using the paper form which can also be found on the department website. This report is due at National on July 1st; if mailed, it is due to Department by May 29th. The following is information shared on the first page that explains the CPR. "The CPR may be the most beneficial document the post will complete. The post's information, combined with that of other posts, is used when the National Commander and others testify on Capitol Hill as mandated by our federal charter. Each post has a story to tell and when we speak collectively our strength is magnified".

Notification of Post/Squadron Commanders & Adjutants Form - Submit as soon as new officers are elected for the current year but no later than July 1st. The Post Adjutant is to complete the form and submit to Department even if the post does not have a Squadron. This report can be found on the Department

As previously stated, the National Commander is the one who makes the assignments; no one else.

This form is also due as soon as new officers are elected or to Department by July 1st.



I am not implying that I have seen this at Maine posts. It is just an example of what clutter in my basement has led to. There are two German wool uniforms that are open to the air. I used these two uniforms as part of my 4th of July exhibit at my post in 2022. When I was able to free them from the clutter, I saw that they were very dusty. I spent a few hours dusting these, as well as several other wool uniforms. You can also see three uniforms that are in a display case. This should be the preferred way to display uniform tunics, but it can be costly. Obtaining for free is a plus. A good source for this type of case is Michael's. You can often get black cases as a 2 for 1 deal. The three you see are from the closure of USAG Darmstadt

Another way to display artifacts is using bookcases. These are not usually good for uniforms because, normally, you only have two uniforms in a case. They are perfect for the display of smaller items, especially headgear. Below are two types of bookcases I have used over the years. The first is a wooden shelf, made up of slats and shelves. They are open all around and dust quickly gathers. You can see both

cloth and metal headgear here. Every play. The problem with this bookcase single one of them are dust magnets. Metal headgear is the easiest to dust. These shelves are cheap.

Another bookcase that is excellent for displaying smaller artifacts is one that is a real bookcase. The shelves are wide enough to display headgear and an assortment of smaller artifacts. Protecting these items from dust is easy. Obtain a 4x8 sheet of Plexiglas and cut it to the bookcase face size. Screw it into place and you have a protected dis-

and Plexiglas option has a price. It can be expensive.

Every historian should have some type of clothes brush at their post. Many of the posts that I have seen artifacts from have done a good job to protect their cloth artifacts. Those that have unprotected uniforms will need the brush to fight off the never-ending battle with dust. Below are photos of three different brushes that are good for brushing dust away. There are smaller ones, but it will take you longer to brush the artifact. I use one that has a handle over the body of the brush.



Those locations are Guam or American Samoa, Johnston Atoll, Cambodia, Thailand, and Laos. If you served at one of these locations or went to one for even a day, call the office so we can talk about it. I recommend all to review and help spread the word of the change. I am afraid that the VA will not go back into the files like it did for the previous changes to notify veterans. It is up to us to do that. This includes surviving spouses whose husband was denied because exposure was not granted due to their service location.

In the last article I talked about the problem with the contracted companies that are handling most of the compensation and pension exams for the VA. As an update I can tell you that the situation is improving. That does not mean that the system is running smoothly. It means that the delay is less than it was and that I am hearing less from veterans that they are told to leave the state of Maine for an exam. If you come across a veteran that was told he must travel outside the state for an exam, please let me know.

VA Received Nearly 113,000 Claims Under PACT **Act, Urges Veterans to Submit Claims Quickly**

The Department of Veterans Affairs ▲ has received nearly 113,000 claims under a new law that expands eligibility for health care and benefits for veterans exposed to burn pits and other toxins, agency officials said Wednesday.

The VA said 112,949 claims by veterans have been submitted as of Oct. 22 under The Sergeant First Class Heath Robinson Honoring Our Promise to Address Comprehensive Toxics Act of 2022, or PACT Act, since President Joe Biden signed it into law on Aug. 10.

More so, the agency is urging more veterans to submit claims quickly. Joshua Jacobs, the VA's senior adviser for policy and acting Veterans Benefits Administration undersecretary, said veterans should submit their claims before August so their benefits begin from the day the PACT Act became law and they will receive back

"We want to make sure veterans know about it and take full advantage of the benefits that they've earned," he said.

After Aug. 10, 2023, the PACT Act service-connection benefits will begin when they are filed.

The PACT Act seeks to provide an easier path to health care and benefits for veterans who served near open-air burn pits, which were used throughout the 1990s and the post-9/11 wars to burn garbage, jet fuel and other materials. Veterans diagnosed with cancer, respiratory issues and lung disease at young ages have blamed exposure to the toxic fumes from that there wasn't sufficient evidence to support their claims.

Additionally, the law expands health care eligibility to post-9/11 combat veterans and adds 23 conditions related to burn pits and other toxic exposures to the VA's list of service presumptions.

The expanded list includes presumptions related to Agent Orange exposure in Thailand, Cambodia, Laos, Guam, American Samoa and Johnston Atoll, strengthens federal research on toxic exposure, and improves the VA's resources and training.

The new law also improves the VA's

workforce and its claims processing to speed up efforts to meet the needs of veterans and establish 31 new VA health care facilities in 19 states.

In August, the VA declared all 23 health conditions outlined in the PACT Act "presumptive" from the date the bill was signed, reducing the burden on veterans or their survivors to prove that certain diseases were caused by service-related exposure to toxins and burn pits.

Jacobs said the decision should deliver more benefits to veterans faster, rather than a phased-in approach.

"It would make it harder for us to do the work that we need to for other veterans and it would be, most importantly, very frustrating for veterans who had to wait,"

VA Secretary Denis McDonough said Tuesday at the agency's monthly news conference that it will begin toxic screenings on Nov. 8 for all veterans now enrolled in the VA system. The screening will consist of a questionnaire that would take five minutes.

McDonough also said more than 15,000 veterans have been screened for toxic exposure at seven different VA sites so far.

"The best thing for vets to do is to be in touch with their primary care provider and make sure that they're getting in to be seen, and in the process of being seen, that they can make sure that they get this toxic exposure screening," McDonough

The law is named for Sgt. 1st Class these pits, but the VA contended for years Heath Robinson, who was diagnosed with a rare autoimmune disorder and lung cancer after serving with the Army National Guard in Kosovo and Iraq, where he experienced prolonged exposure to burn pits. He died in 2020.

> "We want them to know what's in the law, and we want them to know we're excited for them to come in, get the benefits that they've earned, get the health care that they earned, and ultimately feel a sense of pride that we as a country are finally able to take care of them and recognize them for the service," Jacobs said.



Westbrook's annual Veterans Day ceremony is moving this year from its usual setting at the soldiers monument in Riverbank Park to the newly made-

The traditional commemoration and ceremony is set for 11 a.m. Friday, Nov.

Woodlawn's 72-year-old Veterans Rest section is now decked out with a solar-lit flag pole, new pavers, granite curbing, freshly seeded grass and new pavement, along with cleaned and straightened gravestones.

The \$38,000 makeover came in \$7,000 under the City Council's \$45,000 budget for the project, according to Arty Ledoux, director of Westbrook Veterans Service Office, who managed the project.

"It was my baby," Ledoux, a Marine Corps veteran, said Monday, and he is pleased with the results. "It brought dignity and respect."

The majority of the work was contracted out with some performed by Westbrook Public Services.

Veterans Day was first commemorated as Armistice Day in 1919 following the end of World War I. Hostilities had ceased on the 11th hour of the 11th day in the 11th month in 1918. The observance was renamed Veterans Day in 1954 to honor all American veterans of all wars and is a federal holiday.

The Veterans Rest project "had to be completed by September so we could grow grass" in time for the observance, Ledoux said.
