The American Legion, Department of Maine has a long history with the Maine Veterans' Cemeteries across the State. In 1960, The American Legion learned of a plan for joint State-Federal cemeteries, by State Convention in 1962 (in Old Orchard Beach), a resolution was passed attested by Department Adjutant Nathaniel Cobb. The resolution was to establish a Legion committee at the Maine Veterans Cemetery in Augusta since the burial space at Togus was closed. The Committee was tasked with finding land, deciding on building designs, placing flag poles, deciding on marker types, and working on getting legislation passed to support this massive project.

Fast forward to 2023 - A chapel that had stood at the well-established cem-

etery fell into disrepair and was torn down years ago. The committal building that replaced it is heavily utilized and in need of some massive structural renovations. The committal building is an essential tool needed to conduct an interment Service for our fallen comrades.

careers in an economy starved for well-trained and capable employees who care about fulfilling important needs in the nation they swore with their lives to protect and defend.

By adding health care to its portfolio, TFM addresses a need The American Legion has listed among its highest priorities for the Department of Veterans Affairs over the last decade - recruiting and retaining qualified health-care professionals, particularly nurses. The shortage of health-care professionals in the nation right now is estimated at nearly 2 million, so everyone in that industry is competing for talent, more of which is desperately needed.

To keep making progress, TFM looks to continue building its roster of partners from industry, government, education, charitable foundations that want to support the initiative and the veterans community. Online registration forms to get involved are available on the TFM website at taskforcemovement.org.

Most important, all stakeholders including The American Legion - have a responsibility to close these labor gaps because understaffed hospitals, idled trucks and online vulnerabilities do not simply represent economic inconvenience; they threaten our national security.

It also tends to cover third-party parties where bonding may not. A good policy should also cover losses related to non-employee-specific crimes such as:

- Forgery or alteration of negotiable instruments, such as contracts and business checks

- Social engineering fraud resulting in financial losses



Our professionalism fosters quality, memorable engagements with fellow veterans, civic leaders, resource sponsors and the public.

For many, professional conduct is inherent with our mission, while for a minority, acceptable conduct is elusive at times. Superior leadership in a post sets expectations of behavior, etiquette and business manners. Fair and equitable correction of undesired behavior and conduct can be challenging without a written, agreed upon code of conduct (The Code). Our organization's reputation and legacy suffer when members and guests act in ways contrary to our values.

In essence, the Code establishes and promotes a framework for ethical behavis considered right and wrong within a particular context. It sets a standard for honesty, integrity, and fairness while ensuring compliance. A well-defined Code can contribute to a positive, inclusive sense of belonging and shared values. By establishing clear guidelines for behavior, the Code can reduce conflicts and misunderstandings. When everyone knows what is expected, it becomes easier to resolve disputes.

When faced with ethical dilemmas or difficult decisions, members can refer to the Code for guidance. It provides a reference point for making choices that align with our organization's values. Used as a valuable tool during the onboarding process for new members, the Code helps them understand our organization's culture and expectations from the start. When violations occur, the Code provides a basis for holding individuals accountable.

Creating a code of conduct involves a thoughtful and collaborative process to define the expected behaviors and ethical standards. Clearly define the purpose regarding the goals and objectives to be achieved. Determine the scope of the Code and how it applies to members, employees, and guests. Will it cover specific situations or be more general? Gather member input and perspective to identify core values and principles important to your post. When drafting the Code, use plain language to make it easily understandable. Consider organizing the Code

ior and helps individuals understand what into sections or categories that address different aspects of behavior, such as honesty, integrity, diversity, respect, confidentiality, compliance with laws, and such.

> Provide specific examples or guidelines for expected behavior whenever possible. This helps individuals understand how the principles apply to real-world situations. Clearly outline the consequences or discievent of Code violations. This can include warnings, suspensions or termination, depending on the severity of the violation. Establish a process for reporting code of conduct violations. Ensure that individuals feel safe and supported when reporting misconduct and guarantee confidentiality where appropriate.

> The Code is a living document requiring regular review and revision to ensure that it remains relevant and effective. The Code must comply with legal and regulatory requirements. Once the Code is finalized, communicate it to all relevant stakeholders. Enforce the Code consistently and fairly. Address violations promptly and in accordance with the established consequences. Continuously monitor effectiveness soliciting feedback from stakeholders and make improvements as necessary. Officers and leaders should al-

> endorsement. Clear, regular communication using multiple nodes such as email,

posters and meetings ensures everyone is aware of its existence and importance. Establish confidential and accessible reporting mechanisms for code of conduct violations. Encourage individuals to report misconduct without fear of retaliation. Develop a process for investigating and resolving reported violations. Ensure that investigations are impartial and thorplinary measures that may be taken in the ough, and that corrective actions are taken as necessary. Enforce the Code consistently and fairly treating all individuals equally allowing for due process when addressing violations. Maintain records of reported violations, investigations and actions taken. Documentation is essential for accountability and demonstrating compliance with legal and ethical standards. Effective implementation of the Code requires commitment, consistency and discipline to create a culture of ethics, integrity and accountability.

One of my objectives as Judge Advocate and Chair of the Task Force for the Future is to develop a Department of Maine Code of Conduct. Several Departments in our organization have Codes either in their by-laws or as reference documents available to their posts. If a nonprofit is incorporated in a state but has never been recognized by the IRS as "tax-exempt," then it does not have an obligation to file an annual information return with the IRS. family support," added American Legion Auxiliary National President Lisa Williamson, who accompanied Seehafer on some of the post visits. "We know the individual who did these atrocious crimes had some mental health issues and the Legion Family – that's the Legion, the Auxiliary and the Sons of the American Legion – firmly believe in our Be the One mission. And that mission is to destignatize mental health. It's been a taboo subject for far too long."

Matt Jabaut is a Lewiston native and The American Legion National Membership & Post Activities Commission Chairman. "I'm lucky in the fact that I have lots of different families and the Legion obviously being a primary one. Some of the first messages I got were from Legion Family members, who were messaging me and saying 'Hey, are you all right?' They know that I'm from Lewiston, that I live in Lewiston, went to Lewiston High School. It's a big part of my community."

Post 153 in Auburn hosted Seehafer for breakfast Saturday. The post is just a few miles from where the shootings occurred. Paul L'Heureux, a member of the post, described the tight-knit community. "When this came about," he said, "nobody knew who the victims were in the beginning. Within the next eight hours after the event, some of the names started to surface. It became apparent that as large as we thought we were here, we weren't. Your thought process became we are not that big. We are a community of one."

Department of Maine Adjutant Jason Hall also noted the smalltown feel that permeates the state and the impact that such a massive crime has on its residents. "In Maine, every town is a rural town. We're all close knit. Most parts of the country are six degrees away from separation. Maine is two degrees from separation. It almost affected every person in Maine. We either played softball with that person or it was our hairdresser's brother. It was a schoolteacher's aide from your high school. It was somehow connected to every person in Maine."

still about the PACT Act. A good idea is to add information from the Pact Act to your call script. If you are calling a Vietnam-era veteran, start off the call with the added locations and conditions. It may help to get a good conversation started.

There are still questions on the PACT Act so I will again list some of the major changes due to the act passing and becoming law. For the Vietnam veterans the act added these locations: Guam or American Samoa, Johnston Atoll, Cambodia, Thailand, and Laos. For the Gulf War and 911 veterans the act added these locations: from 1990 Bahrain, Iraq, Kuwait, Oman, Qatar, Saudi Arabia, Somalia, and the United Arab Emirates. Then from 2001 Afghanistan, Djibouti, Egypt, Jordan, Lebanon, Syria, Uzbekistan, and Yemen.

The act also added 2 presumptive conditions for exposure to Agent Orange and over 20 for exposure to burn pits and toxic exposure. If you have any questions, please call the office.

PLEASE READ AND RESPOND TO YOUR MAIL FROM THE VA! APPEALS OF CLAIMS.

To my fellow legionnaires, with your support I dedicated this fall's bear and moose hunts (missions) to The American Legion, Department of Maine and The American Legion National for the support provided with the donations through Past Department Commander Thurston's Commanders Project and the OCW grant.

Reboot was able to harvest 14 out of 20 bear missions with one weighing in at 415 lbs., which is a new Reboot record. As of the beginning of this season, Reboot had only harvested 20 moose since the start of the program. This year alone, Reboot was able to fill 16 donated bull moose permits. The support that Reboot received throughout all of their

missions from around the state was mind-blowing.

This is how much we care about doing the right thing. This is the story of brothers helping brothers! I wish to share the following story from a veteran that was on one of those moose mis-

Paul Watkins reached out to me, wanting to donate his tag to a veteran. I always ask what the circumstances are, especially if they call me. Paul said that his daughter, who was his sub-permittee, is in the military deployed overseas and really would like to just donate it. He then told me he heard about us because he is in The American Legion.

At that moment, I knew he was a veteran, and his daughter was serving. I told him we could not accept that tag, but let us figure it out. Well at that point, Reboot was 15 bull tags deep and I suggested we call the state and defer until next year. His concern was that his daughter still would not be able to attend the hunt due to service. I suggested to him as a plan b: let us find someone to bring you hunting for your moose. He was blown away. I said, "Give me a day and see what I can come up with."

Supporting Maine Veterans in Their Transition to Civilian Life

Every year approximately 200,000 servicemembers transition out military service into civilian life. Whether the servicemember is finishing their first deployment or retiring, transition-

ing back into civilian life is a major life event full of uncertainties. After years of structure and order, the transition to the civilian world can feel like a difficult journey without a game plan. Since joining the Senate Veterans' Affairs Committee (SVAC) earlier this year, I have worked to help transitioning servicemembers navigate this path in Maine and across the country because just as they have served the American people, we need to make sure we're serving them.

Earlier this month, SVAC and the Senate Armed Services Committee held a joint hearing, one that I requested, to ensure federal agencies work together to ensure a smooth transition and "warm hand-off" as servicemembers transition to civilian life. For example, many servicemembers have specialized job skills from their roles in the military that can be easily transferred to the civilian workforce. When agencies work together to remove red tape, veterans will face fewer barriers to employment in the civilian job market—especially at a time when there are workforce shortages across the country. This hearing comes on top of my bipartisan legislation to do just that. The Veteran Improvement Commercial Driver License Act will ensure GI benefits can be used at more commercial driving license (CDL) schools – helping veterans maintain access to good jobs while providing trucking companies with additional workers.

I also recently led a group of bipartisan Senate colleagues in introducing The TAP Promotion Act which would allow servicemembers to connect with a VA-accredited representative who can help them navigate the process of accessing their benefits. I know many veterans can speak to the challenges of navigating TAP and I want to be sure we're able to cut through that red tape.

So, our game plan is simple: make sure our veterans have easy access to the benefits they deserve and provide our veterans with opportunities to land a good paying civilian job – all before leaving the service.

That is why I invited VA Secretary McDonough for a summer two-day tour of Maine's VA facilities and the challenges facing our veteran community. During the visit to VA facilities in Rumford, Maine veterans spoke about filing for PACT benefits and the mental health challenges they face after leaving service. In Portland, veterans shared the importance of finding affordable housing for the veteran community. I always say one day of seeing is worth 1,000 pages of reading, and Secretary McDonough definitely saw firsthand how important it is to serve our Maine veterans.

In response to our trip, the federal government has taken multiple steps to provide veterans with services addressing these challenges — resulting in a more transparent post-service game plan. We have one of the highest rates of veteran suicide here in Maine and during September, we were able to shed more light on this urgent issue with the Senate recognizing Suicide Prevention Month. We owe it to our veterans to have open, candid conversations about mental health challenges, while working swiftly to address them.

So I teamed up with the Maine Bureau of Veterans' Service to distribute gun locks and safes, which have been proven to decrease suicides, to our veterans. Gun lockboxes have been proven to help decrease suicide and self-harm. It's amazing that something as simple as a gun lock can save countless lives and I want to be sure every veteran who requests one, is able to receive one. In fact, there have been over 2,500 requests from Maine veterans for these lockboxes. I am glad that Representatives Pingree and Golden joined me in calling on Secretary McDonough to request that the VA set aside more funding for regional offices to provide firearm storage.

But we can't stop at just lockboxes. We need to look at the different factors that lead to self-harm. In a recent Senate Veterans Affairs Committee hearing, I spoke with Dr. Matthew Miller, the Executive Director for Suicide Prevention with the Veterans Health Administration, about how we can support our veterans dealing with financial strain - which is a major contributor to suicide ideation.

Put simply, our game plan is putting veterans first: removing barriers to civilian jobs and providing resources for veterans if challenges arise after leaving the service. Thanks to our servicemembers and veterans, we get to enjoy the American way of life. Now it's up to all of us to return the favor.



of Maine High School Oratorical Scholarship Contest will once again be held at Thomas College in Waterville on February 10, 2024 at 9:00 a.m. Snow Date: February 17, 2024 at 9:00 a.m.

The main purpose of The American Legion Oratorical Contest "A Constitutional Speech Contest" is to develop a deeper knowledge and appreciation for the U.S. Constitution among high school students. Other objectives of the contest include the development of leadership qualities, the ability to think and speak clearly and intelligently, and the preparation for acceptance of the duties, responsibilities, the rights and privileges of American citizenship.

Young orators will have the opportunity to earn some of the most generous scholarships. At the Post and District level, scholarships offered range from \$50 -\$100, and at the State level \$50 - \$1500. At the National level, each department (state) winner who is certified and participates in the National Oratorical Contest's 1st round receives \$2,000 scholarship. Each first round winner who advances to and participates in the second round, but does not advance to the final round, will receive an additional \$2,000 scholarship to pursue education beyond high school. The overall national contest winner gets a \$25,000 scholarship. Second place takes home \$22,500, and third gets \$20,000. The members of the Oratorical Committee will be working with District Commanders to prepare Posts and Districts for their local contests. We hope to have all Post con-



tests completed by Mid-December 2023 and all District contests completed by the end of January 2024.

The 2024 National Finals is May 17-19 in Hillsdale, MI at Hillsdale College. Quarterfinal and semifinal contests are scheduled for Saturday, May 18, with the fischeduled



The following letter was sent to Operation Reboot by Paul Watkins:

My name is Paul Watkins from Lebanon, Maine. After 21 years of "putting in," I was drawn for a bull tag in Zone 3 for Oct. 2023. I was beyond shocked at being selected and at the same time, internal stress was rising for another reason. By the time of the moose drawing in June of 2023, my 19-year-old daughter, who is serving on active duty in the U.S. Air Force, was deployed overseas on short notice. I did not know what to do.

I spoke with Dan Waite from Operation Reboot, explained my situation and we talked about options for the moose tag. I told Dan I was considering donating my tag to another veteran from Operation Reboot as I was having a tough summer with my daughter being deployed. I served as a U.S. Navy Seabee and a Municipal Police Officer, having medically retired in 2006 due to line of duty injuries. I have been sober coming up on nearly 9 years and I know how hard it can be to stay focused and true.

Dan asked me to take 24 hours and just reconsider going on the moose hunt. Dan said if my daughter was to return home in time for the hunt, then to bring her and some active duty people up and just get out there and have fun. I spoke with my daughter that night via email and she told me not to defer or donate the tag and to go forward with the hunt as planned and if she was home in time she would be there.

Dan actually called me back 23 hours and 45 minutes later! Dan asked how everything was going and I told him I would really love to try to fill the tag. I told Dan I did not have a subpermittee though my daughter was unsure of her return date. Dan told me that would not be a problem either and that Operation Reboot had it covered, everything happens for a reason and to stand by. Less than 20 minutes later my phone rang, "Hey Paul, this is Matt Chassion, Operation Reboot Volunteer, I want to get together with you on this tag up in Zone 3". Matt was signed on immediately as the sub-permittee and the rest is history. Unfortunately, my daughter did not make it up to the moose hunt, but more importantly, she returned home safely to Lackland AFB after a long deployment.

It was a privilege and an honor to be part of an event like this. Filling the moose tag itself was unbelievable and the fact it was a bull of a lifetime, is beyond words. I would like to thank everyone at Operation Reboot and beyond with special emphasis on the selfless devotion and professionalism of Volunteer Matt Chassion. Bravo Zulu!

Ship Military Care Packages To Help Be The One

Michelle Williamson simplified the process of shipping for individuals and businesses in 2017 when they founded ShipThrifty, allowing shippers a cost-saving and hassle-free way to create, purchase and print their own shipping labels online with major carriers. A year later, they provided those same ShipThrifty benefits with military families to make shipping care packages to servicemembers overseas and stateside easy. Since then, hundreds of thousands of care packages have been delivered to America's military men and women "to boost morale and bring those away from home a piece of home," Michelle

ShipThrifty's mission to support servicemembers, veterans and their families falls in line with The American Legion's mission. Together, they have formed a partnership to continue caring for servicemembers through the shipping of care packages and the Legion's Be the One suicide prevention initiative.

vou have heard?

Michelle: We've heard firsthand from chaplains that care packages are a tool for saving lives. Struggling service members go to chaplains to get shampoo, a toothbrush or snacks which provides an opportunity for conversations and support when needed. The chaplains also save full boxes for folks they know are struggling or don't get care packages from home to remind them others are thinking about them. With the Be the One initiative, sending care packages is the perfect way to spread the message and get information into the hands of those who need it both here at home and for those serving far away. When the community is asked to be part of the initiative, the message may touch others struggling.

The other thing is the connections from those care packages. We have groups who have sent care packages that are still connected to the service members who got them and communicate and do stuff with

The American Legion spoke with ShipThrifty about the benefits of shipping military care packages through them, how it works, and how ShipThrifty is supporting Be the One. With American Legion Be the One Days on the first of every month where posts are encouraged to raise awareness about Be the One, an idea is for posts to have a care package event and place Be the One brochures in the packages.

them, and it's just a huge opportunity that way.

Question: How does ShipThrifty make shipping to military bases, stateside and overseas, easy?

Michelle: One of the things that we realized when we were dealing with the families was they didn't always know what an APO was. They didn't know how to address a package, and so ShipThrifty is very different from other tools on multiple levels. We have two different address books (for stateside shipping and overseas). The location, city, state and ZIP code fields literally are drop-down menus so people can't type them wrong or make a mistake, and they're not mixed up with the domestic stuff even though they're domestic shipments. We just tried to think of what mistakes would somebody make and try to prevent those mistakes from happening.

And a lot of people don't realize that there are base specific restrictions. If you send a bigger box and you go over 20 pounds, it's going to cost you almost double. These are the tips and the resources and the information that we're able to share with the Legion members.

Question: Many American Legion posts can Le-

merican Legion Family members Rob and packages sent to our servicemembers have that gion Family members send care packages through ShipThrifty. Can you share a success story?

> **Michelle:** Every year we do (a care package event) at the Cannon Falls (Post 142) here in Minnesota. They did almost 600 packages during COVID. With the (ShipThrifty) tools, they're not sitting there doing handwritten customs forms or waiting for hours at the post office. We probably had all labels done and printed in about 45 minutes total.

> **Rob:** We're just super thrilled and proud of being able to help them do this. And that's what we do every day. We talk to people that are looking at doing this, are doing this, because it's all about getting the communities together and the servicemembers care packages, and that's a lot of fun.

> Michelle: It's funny because everybody comes back and says if I would have known this existed, I never would have done it any other way.

> We also do a manifest – one manifest take 500 labels. It's basically a scan, like a barcode that you see at the grocery store on your groceries. (For the Cannon Falls post they took) that to the post office, and it's a single scan and all 500 boxes are checked in. They don't have to wait in line.

> The post office typically has them go to the back and put they call those big bins that they put the packages in pumpkins.

> Question: What are common questions with military shipping that you hear that ShipThrifty can answer?

> Rob: How do we get addresses for servicemembers and what do they need? What should I send right? Can I color the inside of the boxes or the outside of the boxes? If it's if school and young kids are involved, should I sort of filter what gets put into the box and read that before they send it? There's a great little nugget of a story this.

> A school was doing notes (to put in care packages), and these kids were young and one of them wrote very sincerely, "Please don't die." And the group read this, and they were like I don't know if we should send it. Terry, who ran the group, said, "Nope. We're sending that note." She comes to find out months later that (the deployed servicemembers) loved it. They put it on the on the door going out of the base and every time they left, they said, "Not today, kid." And they'd smack that sign.

> Question: How does a Legion post get started with ShipThrifty?

> Michelle: To get started with ShipThrifty, a Legion post can create a free account today at shipthrifty. com/rf/legion. They can also call us at 800-544-4992 or send an email to contactus@shipthrifty.com. A lot of people use the flat rate boxes from the post office and it's one of the most expensive ways to ship packages, and so one of our first tips is let's talk about what you're sending.

> **Rob:** One of the things we love to do is have conversations with groups and people about what they're thinking because we have this very unique perspective. It changes whether you're in Pennsylvania or California, and when we can talk to them sort of early and often, we can really make it simple and find them the best economical way to do it.

specific restrictions. You know, they know that they can't send aerosols. They know that they can't send certain things, but they'll put hand sanitizers in the packages. Hand sanitizers aren't allowed because they contain alcohol. So we try to make sure that people understand what they can send.

Question: Why ship through ShipThrifty?

Michelle: We've got the tools in place and the military expertise, and we know the process back and forth. We've done this with hundreds of different groups both remotely and in person. We actually can talk somebody through coming up with a budget for it, a plan.

Rob: And we help with preventing or reducing the likelihood of return packages. It's about saving the organization time and ideally, money. We have a customer that sends a lot of care packages to servicemembers, spouses when they're deployed, and the way she puts it is, "I feel like I've added you guys to my team." And that's true. We're right there with them.

Question: Why are you passionate about ShipThrifty?

Rob: It's gratitude for me. It's support, its connection to home and then it's that intervention opportunity. Whether that intervention opportunity is talking about Be the One at a care packing event with all of those veterans at the post and their families or community members. We never know whether it's going to be a piece of paper that has Be the One that's in the care package, or whether it's somebody that you hear talking about it at the mall or at a post or at a bake sale. But when you add all these up, the more opportunities there are to spread that word, the more likely it is we individually and collectively can change that and move that needle the other way. And that's why this is all just so important to us.

We were doing an event and one of the gentlemen that I was packing boxes with was one of the first tank commanders in Iraq, and he was telling a story. He said, "I'm reading the Cheeto bag and I'm wondering, where did this come from? Who put these Cheetos in the package?" It's a connection to home and then, he said by the time he left and came home, aside from signs on the base, he said he hadn't seen the written language English for months. So it is that connection to home that is so, so important.

Michelle: I always say we do the best thing in the world because not only do we get to see the notes that come back from the servicemembers, we get to experience the impact that we're having for the people that we're helping do the shipping.

And then the other thing is when I look at the whole Be the One program, this connection is ideal because you're getting to the people who need the information and we're able to spread that Be the One message through the care packages and provide support and that connection.

The Plot and Denouement **Success at Last**

consecutive articles in previous Maine Legionnaire editions has finally come to a successful conclusion. In Greenwood, atop a flat rise opposite the Town Beach, the family cemetery known locally as the Cummings Plot has been by descendant Suzanne Nusbaum. Three fully restored. Three veterans, one from period VA granite gravestones, each the Revolution, another from the War of 1812, and the third from the Civil war, all named Joseph Cummings, along with two other family members, whose graves were wiped out when the cemetery was inadvertently used prior to 1960 as a log landing, once again lie in eternal rest. Each is identified with a new granite gravestone, much like those which were obliterated, and are yet undiscovered.

By rights this report should be divided into three separate chapters, for before the final chapter, wherein a Rededication Ceremony was held, the first chapter was the delivery of the gravestones, and the second chapter, their installation. But let this suffice to tell the story.

The first and second chapters took place in a rush on a single long weekend, the first two days of which were bright and sunny, with high temperatures in the low 80s. The last day was in the high 60s, overcast, and with rain providentially

The noble deed, reported in numerous holding off until mid-afternoon, by which time our work was completed. On Friday, Sept. 8, Commander Orcutt met the representative from Collette Monuments of Lewiston to take delivery of two Cummings family grave markers, paid for weighing approximately 300 lbs, had been stored in the Post 68 emergency generator shed and needed to be transported to the site. Fortunately, Oxford County businesses have a tradition of helping veterans' organizations, often at no cost. Kirk Thurston and Department Historian 1814. "O, say, can you see by the dawn's Louie Marin were invited to Opportunity Enterprises in Mexico, Maine to instruct the clients and staff there on proper raising and lowering of their newly presented flag and to display a flag folding ceremony.

The historian also provided the following flag facts:

During the American Revolution, a variety of flags were flown that would inspire the "Stars and Stripes" we know today, from the "Sons of Liberty" flag to the "Grand Union" flag, which was used by General George Washington's Continental

Continental Congress. It said the flag of the then thirteen United States should "be thirfield, representing a new Constellation."

The original 13-star version of the flag was first unveiled on June 14, 1777, and that is why June 14 is known as Flag Day.

The U.S. Congress continued to make changes to the shape and design of the flag up until 1960, mostly to make room for stars as new states were added. Today, the flag's stars are arranged in 9 rows representing the 50 states, and the 13 stripes represent the original 13 colonies. The last time a star was added was when Hawaii became a state in 1959, so our current 50star flag has flown since July 4, 1960. If the U.S. ever adds a state again, a star would officially be added on the next 4th of July!

Red symbolizes hardiness and valor; blue symbolizes justice, vigilance, and perseverance; and white symbolizes purity and innocence. The U.S. Flag Code gives Americans guidelines and customs for handling the flag. The flag code prohibits changing the flag with additional designs, letters or marks; using the flag for advertising; and hanging the flag upside down unless to signal danger! The code also says the flag should be allowed to fall freely.

- The sixth fold symbolizes where people's hearts lie in keeping with the words of our pledge of allegiance to the flag of the United States of America, and to the republic for which it stands, one nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all.
- The seventh fold pays tribute to the armed forces. After all, through our armed forces, the United States is protected against all enemies.
- The eighth fold is a tribute to those

who died, and as Psalm 23 states, "entered into the valley of the shadow of death."

- The ninth fold honors womanhood.
- The 10th fold is a tribute to fathers.
- The 11th fold represents the lower portion of the seal of King David and King Solomon and glorifies, in Judaism, the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob.
- The 12th fold represents an emblem of eternity and glorifies, in the eyes of Christians, God the Father, the Son and Holy Ghost.
- The 13th and last fold reminds us that when the flag is completely folded, in the uppermost corner signifies our national motto, "In God We Trust."

And Thurston finished with the following, "When the flag is folded and tucked in, the resulting shape appears like the hats of the soldiers who served under General George Washington, and the many who have followed them in order to preserve the rights, privileges and freedoms we enjoy today. So in the future when you see a folded flag, you will have a deeper understanding and appreciation of the tradition."


