Commander Praises Lincoln's 'Moral Clarity'

merican Legion National Commander Daniel Seehafer elaborated on the meaning of right making might during annual American Legion Pilgrimage at this year's pilgrimage. to the Tomb of Abraham Lincoln Monday.

career," Seehafer said during a wreath-laying held on the morning of the 16th president's birthday. "He knew it was right to preserve the Union and emancipate the slaves. His charitable nature would have undoubtedly benefited his most hardened opponents had an assassin's bullet not robbed this nation of his leadership during reconstruction."

Seehafer pointed to Nazi Germany, the Japanese empire and the Soviet Union as examples of military strength without righteous cause.

"They did not have the moral clarity needed to prevail. In fact, they had just the opposite," he said. "Oppression, aggression and genocide were their vices and downfalls."

American Legion Post 32 in J. Springfield, Ill., has led the longest running annual observance held on Lincoln's birthday since 1935. At two keynote addresses at the 90th least 13 departments were represented

- There is not a discounted rate with the three-year membership.
- Membership cards will still be sent annually by Legion posts.

It's been our mission for more than a century, and we will continue to accomplish it. Lincoln believed it when he walked the Earth, and we still believe it and follow that mantra now."

Sons of The American Legion National Commander Don "J.R." Hall also spoke at the wreath laying. "President Lincoln once said, 'The most reliable way to predict the future is to create it," Hall said. "Today, the greatest way to honor him is to create a great future as the American Legion

Family."

Seehafer suggested that Americans should think about Lincoln when they vote. "In November, our nation will once again return to the polls to elect a commander-in-chief. We should all be inspired by the man whose birthday we celebrate today. In this room, we have Democrats, Republicans and Independents, yet we are here for a common cause," Seehafer said. " We are here to remember one of American's greatest presidents. In his heart was not an R, D or an I. It was a V, for veteran. It is ironic that the man who led the nation during its most divided period, and the man who famously said, 'A house divided cannot stand,' is today perhaps the most beloved and unifying figure in American history."

A copy of a letter was given out to everyone pertaining to donations to the National Commander's campaign for those running for that position. We take up donations each year to support the individuals seeking to be the National Commander and support them just as our own Past National Commander, Tony Jordan, when he sought the position. A copy of the letter will appear in the Leadership Ledger if you were not able to attend the conference. Individual donations as well as post donations will be greatly appreciated and encouraged.

More on the happenings of the National Executive Committee since our last meeting: in December, a virtual meeting of the NEC was held to review and consider a resolution pertaining to individuals and other organizations claiming to represent veterans in filing claims and charging outrageous sums were not accredited by the Veterans Administration through the accreditation process. This resolution came from the Veterans Affairs & Rehabilitation Commission and was assigned the number of #1 with the title of "Oppose Claims Filing by Unaccredited Parties." A copy of the whole

resolution is on the Legion's digital archive if you wish to read the complete resolution.

Basically, this resolution affirms that VA-accredited representatives, properly trained, be authorized to file initial claims. The Legion urges Congress to pass legislation restoring criminal penalties for individuals or companies violating VA rules pertaining to representing or charging veterans fees without VA accreditation. Another point is that VSOs, such as The American Legion, be supported in giving and covering appropriate and accurate representation to veterans. The resolution also urges Congress to fully fund and support VA staffing for the enforcement of criminal penalties against those who violate federal laws or VA rules.

The resolution opposed any legislation allowing unaccredited parties to become legal representatives without completing the accreditation process. The American Legion encourages the VA Office of Inspector General and the Office of General Counsel to collaborate with pertinent authorities to identify and prosecute unaccredited individual and private companies. The resolution also rescinded and superseded previous resolutions related to predatory claims companies, claims reviews by private companies, fees for appellate services and the accreditation of individual claims agents. There were four previously approved resolutions that were rescinded.

In closing, thank you all for all you do on a daily basis for the veterans and The American Legion, as well as what you will do. Remember we are in a campaign of "BE THE ONE" and conduct as many buddy checks as you can.

Those who sign up for a multiyear membership will not receive a renewal notice during the time they have signed up for the multiyear membership.

Please note that the multiyear membership will work just like PUFL. Whatever rate the member renews at is what the post/department/national will receive for the duration of that timeframe. For example, if a member renews today (before national percapita \$5 dues increase come July 1, 2024), National will receive \$18.50 for the next three years. For example, if a department's per capita is currently

\$10 and is going to be raised to \$15 on July 1, 2024, then the department will receive the \$10 for the next three years. Once the member renews after the three-year renewal is up, the renewal rate will adjust to the rate at that time.

A multiyear membership was approved by the National Executive Committee of The American Legion during the organization's Spring Meetings last May. Resolution 1: Purchase of Multiple Years of Membership approves "a five-year pilot program offering the purchase of three consecutive 12-month member terms at the then current dues rate."

et's discuss topic paramount importance in the realm of non-profit organizations, of which we are, and that having well-structured constitution and bylaws. It is a new year and an excel-

lent opportunity to at least review your current documents. If your constitution and/or bylaws address post membership dues, it is critical to remember that National and Department are increasing their respective dues effective July 1. Always remember to send your most current constitution and bylaws to the Department Adjutant for recordkeep-

Firstly, let us understand the essence of a constitution for a non-profit organization. Much like the constitution of our nation, it provides the fundamental principles that govern the organization. It outlines its mission, vision, and values, encapsulating the very essence of why the organization exists and the change it aspires to bring about. I dare say most posts use the constitution framework guidance outlined by National. That is fantastic, but because the language can be seen as boilerplate, members may not necessarily take the time to think about what it really means. Are we working within the Four Pillars? Are we a Legion post with a bar, or are we a bar with a Legion post? Are we seen as a veteran service organization first and foremost? A well-crafted constitution acts as a compass, guiding your post through challenges and ensuring it stays true to its founding principles.

Equally crucial are the bylaws, the detailed operational framework that outlines the rules and procedures governing the post's day-to-day activities. These bylaws provide the necessary structure for decision-making processes, the roles, and responsibilities of board members, who are your post officers, and the procedures for elections and meetings to highlight a few concepts.

To deviate slightly from the main discussion, consider the importance of your post officers and why it is essential to have the right people in the right position at the right time. In a non-profit corporate structure, the post officers are the board of directors who have fiduciary responsibilities to the

corporation, i.e. your posts. It is imperative that elected officers and the entire membership understand that these fiduciary responsibilities are not burdens but commitments to the organization.

At the heart of a post officer's fiduciary responsibilities lies the duty of loyalty. This duty compels officers to act in the best interests of the post and its mission, prioritizing post goals over personal interests or external influences. It's a solemn commitment to the cause, a dedication that demands unwavering allegiance to the American Legion's purpose and the community

Simultaneously, the duty of care underscores the obligation for post officers to exercise diligence, prudence, and sound judgment in their decision-making. Whether it involves financial matters, programmatic initiatives, or strategic planning, post officers must engage with a level of expertise and attentiveness that ensures the post's resources are utilized effectively and responsibly.

The third primary fiduciary responsibility is **obedience**. This duty requires post officers to ensure that the organization operates in accordance with its stated mission, adheres to applicable laws and regulations, and remains true to its charitable purpose.

Strong post officers and bylaws act as the organizational GPS, ensuring that everyone involved is on the same path toward the common goal. That goal or goals which are the crux of your post's constitution.

One of the key benefits of having a constitution and bylaws is the assurance of transparency and accountability. These documents clearly delineate the distribution of authority, the decision-making process, and the responsibilities of the membership. This transparency not only fosters trust among stakeholders but also attracts donors and supporters who want to ensure their contributions are being utilized effectively and ethically.

According to the 38 C.F.R. section 14.629(b) "No Individual may assist claimants in the preparation, presentation, and prosecution of claims for VA benefits as an agent or attorney unless he or she has first been accredited by the VA for such purpose". If you find yourself in a situation, where you are asked by a veteran to assist them file a claim, please protect yourself and the American Legion and refer them to my office. If it is discovered that a member of the American Legion Department of Maine is assisting veterans file a claim without being accredited, that individual will be brought before the Department Executive Committee.

Today, the #1 issue facing those who served is veteran suicide. According to the National Veteran Suicide Prevention Annual Report. 17 veterans still die by suicide each day, or more than 6,000 each year. The rate of suicide for veterans is more than 50% higher than that of non-veteran adults.

The American Legion is activating a national platform to end veteran suicide.

The Be The One campaign will: Destignatize asking for mental health support, creating opportunities for those with mental health issues to speak freely and get the support they need; Provide peer-to-peer support and resources in local communities; Deploy FDA-approved therapeutics for veterans to identify issues and find resources for support.

The American Legion Department of Maine I is announcing training dates for the BE THE ONE initiative, a campaign aimed at reducing the rate of veteran suicide. The American Legion is leading a nationwide effort — "Be The One"— to eliminate the stigma related to mental health treatment, and in turn, lower the number of veterans who die by suicide every day.

The number of veterans who die by suicide every day is estimated at between 17 and 22. The American Legion has elevated Be The One to be its top priority, empowering veterans, servicemembers, their family members and civilians to act appropriately when a veteran may be at risk. This training intends to bring more awareness to the problem while providing resources to those who may be able to help save the life of a veteran.



Ensuring Maine's Veterans Receive the Benefits They Earned

Maine proudly boasts one of the largest populations of veterans in the country our friends, family members, and neighbors are the true embodiment of "Dirigo" and what it means to

lead others in a life of service. It is a privilege to serve on the Senate Veterans' Affairs Committee working on behalf of veterans here in Maine, and across the nation, to ensure they can access the benefits they have rightly earned.

To kick off the year, I requested that the Committee hold a field hearing at the University of Maine Augusta to listen directly to the challenges facing our veterans. Half of the Maine veterans enrolled in VA are over 65, with a significant increase projected over the next decade. We are also facing a serious workforce shortage at the VA, which is limiting access to critical long term care services. We need to address this shortage for our veterans — whether it's through expanding nursing programs, filling gaps with technology or other solutions to ensure our veterans are able to receive timely and adequate care right here at home. I always want to ensure veteran voices are being heard both in Maine and in Washington, D.C.

Beyond that field hearing, I've also been working with my committee colleagues to help smooth the transition for the nearly 200,000 Americans nationwide who shift from military service to civilian life. In addition to helping them more easily join the workforce, we also need to make sure we are removing barriers to veterans' care. To kick off the year, I introduced legislation to give combat veterans the option to enroll in their health care benefits program before they officially transition out of active duty. Currently, transitioning servicemembers must wait until they have left the service and receive their official separation paperwork — which

can take months — to apply for health care and other services. My bipartisan Combat Veterans Pre-Enrollment Act would help cut any gaps in care by creating an opt-in program allowing veterans to access VA services starting day one as a civilian.

In fact, studies have shown the first year of a servicemember's transition to civilian life is the most difficult and a time when they are at a higher risk to commit suicide. By allowing servicemembers who have served in combat to pre-enroll in VA care, the goal is to provide them access to the mental and physical care they deserve immediately after separation. With veterans facing so many challenges in their return home, my hope is this bill will be another step forward in making their transition less daunting than it needs to be.

We also need to provide our low-income veterans and veterans with service-connected disabilities the reimbursements for travel to and from VA medical appointments that they are entitled. Unfortunately, the VA's current reimbursement program has left too many veterans in the lurch - sometimes waiting months with hundreds of dollars in claims at any one time. So, with a bipartisan group of my colleagues, I wrote a letter to Treasury Secretary Janet Yellen and VA Secretary Denis McDonough urging them to address the issues with the reimbursement system. Reimbursement rates for nursing homes and at-home care have also not kept up with rising costs, which has led to the closure of 17 nursing facilities and many home-health agencies. This is unacceptable — we owe our veterans the very best in return for the many sacrifices they have made in service to our country.

From cutting bureaucratic tape to better ensuring VA accessibility and working together to expand our direct care workforce, it is clear we have a lot work to do to support our veterans. Just as they served us during their career, we have an obligation to return that favor.

Advocating for Veterans and Their Families

The American Legion is one of the world's great service organizations. You continue to serve long after your days in uniform are over as a powerful and informed voice for veterans' rights.

Maine is home to more than 109,000 veterans, which is more veterans per capita

than all but three of the other states in the country. We are proud of our State's commitment to protecting our nation.

For years, I have served on the Senate Appropriations Committee, where I have advocated for our veterans and their families. In my current role as Vice Chairman of that Committee I will continue to champion the heroes who have made such great sacrifices for our nation and for our world.

Among my priorities is advancing the *Major Richard Star Act*, legislation to provide combat-injured veterans with less than 20 years of military service their full benefits. Currently, military retirees with combat-related injuries qualify for retirement pay for their service. These retirees also qualify for disability compensation for injuries acquired in combat.

For retired veterans with less than 20 years of service, however, their disability pay is deducted from their retirement pay. That's roughly 42,000 patriots who put their lives on the line to defend our freedom yet who are denied their full benefits. The Major Richard Star Act would repeal this unfair offset, allowing this group of disabled veterans to receive both their retirement pay and their disability compensation. The bill is named in honor of U.S. Army Major Richard A. Star-a father, husband and decorated war veteran who because of his combat-related injuries, was medically retired. Major Star sadly lost his battle with cancer three years

This bipartisan bill would address an unfair provision in current law that has enormous financial implications for many veterans and their families. By ensuring that disabled combat veterans are eligible to receive disability benefits and retirement benefits concurrently, we can continue to make progress toward fulfilling our obligation to veterans in Maine and throughout the country who have sacrificed so much for our nation

The brave men and women who have served in our military put themselves in harm's way to defend our nation, and it is our responsibility to provide them with the highest quality health care for any illnesses linked to their military service. For far too long, veterans exposed to toxic substances during their deployments have not received the recognition or resources they needed. In the last Congress, with strong support from the American Legion, we passed the PACT Act to ensure that all generations of veterans exposed to and made ill by toxins receive the health care and benefits they have earned through their

Since enactment of the *PACT Act*, some out-of-state trial lawyers have targeted veterans across the country with television ads advertising their legal services but charging veterans an exorbitant amount for their services --sometimes as much as 60 percent of the money a veteran is awarded in a suit. That is why I have co-sponsored the *Protect Camp Lejeune VETS Act*, which caps the fees lawyers can charge veterans filing a lawsuit under the *PACT Act*.

I am also working to provide our men and women in uniform today with the resources required to meet today's challenges to our national security. I will continue to be a champion for the heroes who have made such great sacrifices for our nation and for our world. Thank you for your service to our country. It is an honor to serve you in the Senate.

The primary mission of the Department Finance Officer is twofold.

First is the preservation of the assets of The American Legion, Department of Maine. This includes but is not limited to, assuring that all assets are identified and secured and that they are updated in a timely and economical manner.





PURPOSE

REPRESENTATION

The decision of the selection of alternate delegates to represent absent delegates is a matter of decision within the respective delegations. All Legionnaires, Auxiliary members, Sons of the American Legion, and guests are invited to attend the convention as guests but have no voice or vote unless delegates.





> "PILOTS MAN YOUR PLANES" the order goes over the bullhorn, shattering the morning stillness. The red, green and white shirts leave the flight deck to the catwalks on both sides of the flight deck. The brown shirt plane captains have been busy giving their plane its preflight check and climb out of the cockpit to greet the pilot coming from the ready room where he received his orders and is trotting toward the plane, where the plane captain helps with the seatbelts.

"Now clear the decks, remove all chocks and tie-downs." At this word, the blue shirt plane pushers run to the plane assigned and remove the tiedown and chocks. The pilots, by this time, are satisfied with the condition of the plane, and the blue shirts head for the catwalks.

Two men in blue shirts yank the chocks from the wheels, another man





another yellow shirt plane director who stands near the port catapult. This plane director coaxes him into position. That is my job, as the petty officer in charge of the plane directors on the flight deck.


The catapult crew spring into action, one green shirt connects the hold-back release to the plane, as two others slither under the plane, very close to the spinning propeller, to attach the catapult "bridle," a noose-like length of strong wire rope which will throw the plane into the air. The pilot releases his brakes on the catapult and the plane moves a little forward, making the cable secure in the catapult.

The flight deck officer signals the pilot to move his head back against the head rest and apply maximum power, then the officer makes a circular motion with his hand for the pilot to increase his throttle to full power and with his outstretched arm points go, and the plane is shot into the air. When all the planes leave on that mission, the flight deck is usually then cleared for any emergency landings as the ship slowly turns back to its original course, also making sure all the ships around them turn at the same time.



Another plane director will direct the pilot and blue shirts to fold the wings and park the plane, lock the tailwheel and chock the wheels. The fire crew are ready for every landing, in case of a crash, fire or fuel spilled on the deck.

On the TULAGI I made a few changes: first, the method of positioning the plane on the catapult. Second, I had the carpenter shop make a Ouija (pronounced "wigi") board (a scale model

of the flight deck and flat scale models of each plane with the wings folded,) which I used to plan parking the planes forward of the barrier.

I also removed the chain across the forward edge of the flight deck used to keep anyone from falling. Doing this, I was able to park more planes forward of the barrier and would not have to send any down on the elevator, stopping the planes from landing. By making the change to the catapult during the invasion of Southern France, we broke the fleet record in the time it takes to send each plane into the air.

The shirt colors have changed a little after WWII. I think the plane handlers wore brown on the Tulagi...

Delivering his prepared opening remarks, Cossette paid tribute to American prisoners of war and those servicemen and women still unaccounted for and listed as missing in action.

"Those who have served and those currently serving in the uniformed service of the United States are ever mindful the sweetness of enduring peace has been tainted by the bitterness of personal sacrifice," Cossette said. "We are compelled to never forget that while we enjoy our daily pleasures, there are those who have endured and may still be enduring the agony of pain, deprivation, and imprisonment."

Before the traditional laying of wreaths, the honor gun salute, and the paying of taps, Cossette explained the ceremony for POWs and those missing in action held at the beginning of American Legion meetings and other American Legion and American Legion Auxiliary events.

A small table and chair is set for one and placed in the meeting room. The table is covered with a white table cloth. A single rose is placed in a vase, adorned with a red ribbon. A slice of lemon is placed on a dish and salt is sprinkled on the dish. A glass is inverted, and a candle and an American flag is placed on the

Cossette said the table is small and set for one to symbolize the fact a member

The tablecloth is white symbolizing the purity of the service member's intentions to respond to their country's call to arms. The single red rose in the vase signifies the blood they may have shed to ensure the freedom of the United States of America. The rose is also a reminder of the family and friends of the POWs and MIA servicemen and women.

The red ribbon around the vase represents an unyielding determination for a proper accounting of the POWs and those missing in action. The slice of lemon on the plate is a reminder of their

The sprinkled salt on the dish recalls the countless, fallen tears shed by the families that wait. The inverted glass signifies the unaccounted for service member cannot toast at this time.

The chair is empty because the service member is not here. The candle is reminiscent of the light of hope. The American flag reminds everyone many of the missing may never return and have paid the supreme sacrifice to ensure America's freedoms, Cossette said.

Cossette also recognized the town of Wiscasset for the work done on the Veterans Honor Monument grounds within the past month. The work included replacing chimney bricks with paving bricks to create a walking path completely around the monument.

The work was accomplished by the town's public works crew and contractor Mark Rego. The upgrade was funded by a carryover from the public works budget last year. The funding source was suggested by Public Works Director Ted Snowton, recommended by Town Manager Dennis Simmons, and approved by the Wiscasset Select Board.

We had some money left over in the budget, and are happy we were able to get the maintenance at the site done," Snowton said in a brief late telephone interview.




